REAGAN LETTER TO SYRIAN PRESIDENT CAUSES STIR

- A possible source of friction between Israel and the U.S. developed after publication of a letter Pre-sident Reagan sent to President Hafez Assad of Syria, reportedly intimating that Washington would include the return of the Golan Heights to Syria on the agenda of broadened Middle East negotiations peace based on United Nations Security Council Resolution 242.

The letter was sent on Syria's National Day marking its independence at the end of the French Mandate, According to a report in the Wall Street Journal, quoting the official Syrian newsagency, SABA. Reagan's letter said: "We believe that the best way to serve the future

JERUSALEM (WNS) of your country and the prosperity of vour people is by reaching a peaceful and just settlement to the problems of the region Therefore, I continue to work for expanded negotiations on the basis of United Security Nations Resolution Council 242, which ca'ls for the exchange of terrifor real peace and applies to the West Bank, Gaza, and the Golan Heights.

Israeli policy mawere not reassured by the assertion from Administration officials in Washington that Reagan's message to Assad contained nothing new and was no more than a reiteration of longstanding American positions on the mean-

DETERMINED FOR SUCCESS

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Secretary of State George Shultz arrived here for a 24 hour visit which included meetings with Premier Menachem Begin and other leading officials in an effort to wrap up an agreement on the withdrawal of all foreign forces from Lebanon and security arrangements along the Israeli-Lebanon

After two meetings with Begin, Shultz departed to Beirut as part of his shuttle diplomacy efforts to bring to a successful conclusion the Lebanon - Israel negotiations that have dragged on for more than four months. Shultz said he intends to stay in the region for as long as necessary in order to finalize an agreement.

Shultz declared on landing at Ben Gurion Airport that "so much has already been achieved in the negotiations that none of us can allow it to fail." This was viewed as a statement of determination to achieve success and a warning against failure. He agreed with Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir, who greeted him at the airport, that some of the outstanding issues between Israel and Lebanon would be "difficult" to resolve. But he added that the "immediate task" was to bring "peace to Lebanon, restoring Lebanon's sovereignty, withdrawal of all foreign forces and ensuring peace and security on (Isracl's) northern border."

Shultz went directly from the airport to Jerusalem for intensive working sessions with
