TEL AVIV (WNS) -- normal staff on duty. Efforts to settle 1s- A mass hunger strike three- month outside rael's old doctors strike suffered a setback when representatives of the 8,500 publicly employed physicians broke off negotiations with government representatives after 30 hours of talks.

A spokesman for the Israel Medical Association said the employers made no new offers and the doctors were not prepared to continue "useless talks," The employers are the government, represented by the Treasury, Kupat Cholim, the Histadrut sick fund and representatives of Hadassah Hospital in Jerusalem, They had hoped that the three days of intensive negotiations would bring a settlement.
