

DOCTORS BREAK RANKS IN 4 MONTH OLD STRIKE

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Doctors employed by Kupat Cholim, the Histadrut sick fund, broke ranks with government - employed physicians when their Council voted 63-61 to end their four-month-old strike. Kupat Cholim clinics, which have been open only two days a week since the strike began to treat emergencies and chronically ill elderly patients, will return to a daily basis. But the vote must be ratified by the Central Committee of the Israel Me-

dical Association. Kupat Cholim doctors represent only a third of the 8,500 members and their back-to-work decision may be aborted. The Medical Association is opposed to ending the strike as long as the Treasury insists that salary increases for doctors cannot exceed the 22 percent national wage ceiling agreement reached between the government and the Histadrut. Health Minister Eliezer Shostak said that the dispute with the Finance

Ministry derived from the fact that the wage accord with Histadrut does not apply to doctors who have their own independent union. The 22 percent ceiling is not the only matter at issue. The doctors' work contract has not been amended since 1961. Physicians are thus the only sector of the work force bound by a 20-year-old agreement. They insist that they should not be required to work 100 hours a week to earn a reasonable income whereas most other salaried employees work a 35 - 40 hour week.

EHRLICH SUFFERS STROKE - DIES

JERUSALEM (WNS) --Deputy Premier Simcha Ehrlich died Sunday, June 19th at Bikur Cholim Hospital where he was admitted following a stroke.

Hospital sources indicated the 78-year-old Cabinet minister's condition had deteriorated when he was described as functioning normally, except for paralysis of his legs. A later bulletin reported that Ehrlich was not conscious and that only family members

were allowed at his bedside. Premier Menachem Begin visited the hospital but did not enter Ehrlich's room.

Ehrlich, a leader of Likud's Liberal Party Wing, also holds the post of Minister of Agriculture. He served as Finance Minister during the Likud government's first term. Some of his colleagues expressed concern today over the possible effects of his absence at a time when the Liberal Party is faced with

an internal schism. Shortly before he fell ill, Ehrlich expressed confidence that he would be able to prevent a faction headed by Energy Minister Yitzhak Modai from breaking away from the party. Ehrlich underwent open heart surgery in the U.S. several months ago. He was given five arterial bypasses. It was not clear whether his earlier condition was in any way related to the cerebral blood clot he suffered.

SHCHARANSKY ILL FROM DRUGS

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Imprisoned Jewish activist Anatoly Shcharansky has become seriously ill from drugs administered to him by Soviet doctors to treat a heart ailment, his wife, Avital, told the Greater New York Conference on Soviet Jewry (GNYCSJ). She said she had that news from Shcharansky's

mother, Ida Milgrom, in a telephone call from Moscow and reportedly Mrs. Milgrom told her daughter-in-law that she received a short letter from her son, in which he explained that he was unable to write for more

than a few minutes because of his physical condition. According to Mrs. Milgrom, Shcharansky wrote that the authorities at Chistopol Prison where he is confined gave him new medication early in May after he

complained of severe chest pains. He developed an allergic reaction to the drug which caused sores and swellings on his hands and entire body.

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
