Scientists Protest Treatment Of Soviet Jewish Colleague

Physicists from around the world attending a major international scientific conference in Crete, have protested to Soviet authorities against the refusal to allow Professor Armen Khachaturyan and his wife to attend the conference and the continued denial to them of an exit visa to emigrate, the World Jewish Congress reported today.

According to the Central Board of Jewish Communities in Greece, the WJC affiliate in the country, the protest took the form of a letter signed by some one hundred participants at the International Conference on Phase Transformations in Solids which took place earlier this month. In addition, the scientists underwent a partial fast in solidarity with the hunger strike that the Khachaturyans and two other Soviet Jewish scientists were on for the duration of the four-day conference.

The protest letter, signed by conference attendees from countries as widely dispersed as Japan and Mexico, was directed to E.P. Velikov, Vice-President of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR. The letter states that the refusal to allow Khachaturyan's participation at the Conference "is a disservice to international science that reflects badly on your Academy." It expresses distress "that this action is only the most recent step in a pattern of professional harassment

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of the Khachaturyan family." It urges the Soviet government to allow the Khachaturyan family to join their relations abroad and warns of questions raised as to whether other Soviet scientists who are permitted to travel would in the future receive invitations to such conferences.

The letter notes that the burden of persecution had driven Khachaturyan, in company with a number of his colleagues, to go on a hunger strike for the duration of the conference. "We extend our support and sympathy to him as physicists from many countries and are undertaking a partial fast on this day, the scientists declared.

Professor Armen Khachaturyan and his wife Svetlana, leading experts in the theory of phase transformations, first applied to emigrate to Israel in July 1981. The other Soviet scientists who joined in the hunger strike were Edward Nadgornyi, an authority in dislocation dynamics, and Leonid Ozernoy, a leading specialist in theoretical astrophysics. Persecution of these outstanding scientists also followed their application for exit visas to Israel.
