

## Three Arab Students Murdered

HEBRON (WNS) - In swooped down in a authorities. The incident was followed by riots in several West Bank

in Hebron, the largest Arab city on the West Bank. Chief of Staff Gen. Moshe Levy said: "We are operating on two planes: first to prevent developments of disorder and attacks in the wake of the incident and second, to investigate every direction to reveal who committed these murders.

But according to last reports the investigation was gaining little progress. The difficulties that emerged included the fact that the attack, described as "very professional," was also carried out extremely fast -- five to seven minutes. Premier Menachem Begin was quoted by Israel radio as saying the attack was a "despicable act." Deputy Foreign Minister Yehuda Ben Meir Foreign Minister Yehuda Ben Meir declared: "I have no words to express my condemnation of this outrage and atrocity which was perpetrated by evil people in Hebron." He pledged that the government "will do everything in its power to find the evil people responsible for this despicable act and bring them to justice."

Israeli security sources are investigating two theories, one that the attack was carried out by Jewish settlers in the spiraling violence and counter violence in Hebron, and the other that the attackers were Palestinian terrrorists. 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Tension has been at a high level in Hebron, which is sacred to Jews and Moslems. A yeshiva student, Aharon Gross, was stabbed to death in the vegetable Hebron market, touching off a rampage by Jewish settlers against Arab Residents. Another reason for the continued tension between Arabs and Jews has been the sudden influx of thousands of ultra nationalist Jewish settlers, led by Rabbi Moshe Levinger.

The settlers have build a modern township in Kirvat Arba, directly adjacent to Hebron. They have also moved into Hebron's old Jewish quarter, living under Israeli guard. Hebron had a substantial Jewish presence until 1929 when Arab rioters murdered 67 Jews. Officials said the hit and run attack July 26 was the worst single in-cident on the West Bank since May, 1980 when six Jews were ambushed and shot dead when returning to their homes from a synagogue in Hebron.

In the rioting that broke out following the shooting incident, Hebron and neighboring villages, as well as the Nablus cashbah and the nearby Balata camp were placed un-der curfew. At Bar Zeit University, a center of Palestinian nationa-lism, several hundred students attempted a protest march along the Jerusalem - Ramallah

highway, according to security reports. Several students were wounded in the demonstrations as security forces fired rubber bullets into the crowds. Scores of Arab students were detained for questioning. A twoday strike called by Palestinian activists on the West Bank received only spotty support.
