

Downtown's Newest Casino Is A Knockout

Even frequent visitors to fabulous downtown Las Vegas are amazed by the changes that are taking place at Del Webb's Mint Casino/Hotel.

The Mint, one of the most popular destinations in Las Vegas, has undergone a complete multi-million-dollar renovation that has given it a stylish new appearance.

A new gift shop is fully stocked with items to make a stay at the Mint more enjoyable and the hotel registration desk has been redesigned for quick and easy check in and check out.

The new Keno Lounge is a popular addition to the Mint, and offers comfort and convenience.

Many of the Mint's spacious hotel rooms and suites have already been completely renovated and redecorated. The final phase of the project will be the total updating of all 300 rooms and suites.

Planning for the renovation of the Mint began in January 1983 under the direction of The Hill Partnership, an award-winning interior design/architectural firm based in Newport Beach, Calif. Actual construction was carried out by Del Webb Construction Services, a subsidiary of the Del E. Webb Corporation.

A Hamish Welcome For The Olympics in Los Angeles

SHALOM ALACHEM '84, a Los Angeles-based group of Jewish professionals, is offering a creative solution to the projected housing crisis during their city's Olympic Games next summer.

"It's a once in a lifetime opportunity for the Los Angeles Jewish Community to show hospitality to their brethren throughout the world," says Brenda Walt, organizing director of the project.

From July 29 through August 12, twelve thousand athletes from around the world will compete in twenty-three different sports. With over half a million visitors vying for only 145,000 hotel rooms, many olympic fans face disappointment next summer.

Walt asserts that hundreds of Jewish families are eager to say "Shalom Alachem" (the traditional travelers welcome). "We're the clearing house which can match visitors and
