Shamir Sharply Rebukes Egypt For Reneging On Camp David Accord

JERUSALEM (WNS) — Premier Yitzhak Shamir denounced Egypt in the Knesset for reneging on its treaty obligations toward Israel. He said Egypt's behavior called into question the credibility of its agreements and claimed Israel had tried repeatedly to improve relations with Cairo but was rebuffed.

Shamir spoke in reply to an opposition motion presented by Labor Party Secretary General Haim Barley who charged that the hardline policies of the Likud government made it incapable of fostering normal relations with Egypt and urged early elections to effect a change. Shamir's speech was his harshest

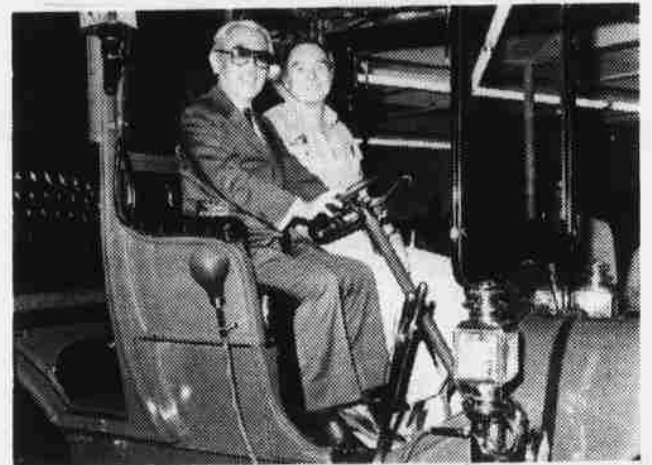
criticism of Egypt since he took office as Prime Minister last year.

Shamir seized upon Egypt's failure to return its Ambassador to Israel after he was called home for "consultations" when Israel invaded Lebanon in June, 1982. Egypt "has no intention at all of returning its Ambassador and achieving really normal relations," Shamir charged. He said that was the "clear conclusion" to be drawn from the many "excuses" offered by the Egyptians to explain their envoy's continued absence.

"When Egyptian representatives are asked, they cite the Lebanon war, or sometimes they cite the Taba issue, or sometimes they cite the Palestinian problem, saying that after we solve it they will send back the ambassador," Shamir said. "These are excuses" and Israel will "draw the conclusion," he added.

According to Shamir, "The Egyptian government's behavior impairs the credibility of the agreement and commitments which it undertook upon itself in the past. It impairs too, the credibility of agreements and commitments which Egypt or any other government in this region may take upon itself in the future."

Japanese Auto Parts Magnate Visits Famed Imperial Palace Auto Collection

East met West in the Imperial Palace Auto Collection (Las Vegas) when owner Ralph Engelstad recently greeted Koji Sumino. Mr. Sumino is president of Autobucs, a Japanese automotive parts conglomerate.

It was Autobucs which "imported" 30 antique and classic automobiles from the Imperial Palace Collection to be the star attraction at two mammoth auto shows in Tokyo and Osaka in July-August of 1983. The cars, valued at \$2.6 million, were secured in custom containers for the long trip by truck to Long Beach and by ship to Yokohama.

When Ralph Engelstad, owner of the Imperial Palace Hotel, met Mr. Sumino in Tokyo, he invited Sumino to see the rest of his collection when he could travel to Las Vegas.

To commemorate their visit, the Japanese guests planted a pine tree on the grounds of the hotel. In the Auto Collection (located on the fifth floor of the hotel's parking facility), Sumino presented Engelstad with a smaller replica of a "kabuto," a head-dress worn by the chief samurai warrior, the shogun, centuries ago.

Also presented to the staff of the Auto Collection was a traditional Japanese painting on rice paper.

Standing by his 1934 Duesenberg SJ, Engelstad gave his guest a ceramic decanter modeled after that classic auto.

The Imperial Palace Auto Collection is open daily from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. On display in a plush, gallery-like setting are more than 200 vintage autos. Automotive books and memorabilia are available in the gift shop.
