The Prince and Princess were presented with a child's rocking chair, made by elderly members of the JWB day center, and asked jokingly whether it was for young Prince William or the second Royal baby the Princess is expecting.

At the dinner, which raised more than 1,000,000 lbs. (approx. US \$1.5 million) to help the JWB expand its services, Prince Charles paid tribute to Jews as "great organizers and great doers", and spoke of the "immense number of concerned Jewish volunteers who work tirelessly" to help the old. "Jewish communities set an example of caring," the Prince told the 750 diners.

The JWB is Britain's largest Jewish social service agency, maintaining residential homes and day centers for the elderly, the mentally ill, and their families.

On a somber note, Prince Charles lashed out at the small "hard core" of youngsters "who think nothing of beating up old people outside or inside their homes" just for their savings and at those young people who seem "increasingly to despise the old."

"The special relationship between young and old traditionally was Nature's way of squaring the circle of life," he said. "Now it seems old people find themselves in homes cared for by devoted people, but cut off completely from younger people."

In conjunction with The National Health Screening Council For Volunteer Organizations, Health Fair '84 once again has selected The Boulevard Mall as one of its' main sites.
