Letter From Shcharansky

NEW YORK - A letter from Soviet Jewish Prisoner of Conscience Anatoly Shcharansky reveals his strong spirit and intellect, despite his poor health and the harsh conditions of his imprisonment, according to excerpts received by the National Conference on Soviet Jewry (NCSJ). The letter was sent to his mother, Ida Milgrom, on March 14.

"The situation one finds oneself in here," Shcharansky writes, "provides one with a wonderful opportunity to become the real master of one's destiny, and to feel these great privileges a man is granted by the feeling of inner freedom and independence from the chaos outside." His insight continues, the NCSJ reported, with a discussion of Future Shock, by American sociologist Alvin Toffler. Shcharansky observes: "if man will not be able to attain spiritual independence from this race for the future, or perhaps from his own self, a catastrophe is imminent."

Describing his heart ailment with what NCSJ Chairman Morris Abram characterized as a calm manner and a sense of humor, Shcharansky notes that "The last issue of Zdorovie (Health) Magazinejust don't think I take it seriously-had an article describing osteochondrosis, all the symptoms of which reminded me of an infarction (heart attack). Having read the article," he elaborates, "I realized instantly...that I am indeed suffering from osteochondrosis..." Of his symptoms - inability to sit for long periods, or to lie on the left side -Shcharansky nevertheless implies that there is no immediate cause for alarm.

Abram stressed that Shcharansky is undaunted by his physical disability, or by the cold, tedium and restrictions of life in the "Gulag." He pointed out that Shcharansky's determination to live as a Jew in Israel, and to be reunited with his wife Avital there, comes through in the letter.

"I observe (Shabbat)," Shcharansky writes, "in the following way: I read parts of Solomon's proverbs and some other wise books, excerpts from which I had copies when I had, for a short time, the possibility of reading the Bible. I then filled a whole thick notebook with these writings. Your parcel will, of course, also come in handy at the Shabbat table.

"And where, I wonder, is my wife observing this Sabbat?...I can imagine how sick she must be of travelling!...Would it not be nice to lie down somewhere on the beach in Eilat, to go for a swim in the Red Sea."

Warsaw Diary By Young Girl Is Donated To Holocaust Museum

The diary of a 17-year-old girl, describing her life hidden in a cellar in Warsaw during the first 113 days of the Nazi occupation of the Polish capital, has been donated the Holocaust Memorial Museum at Kibbutz Lohameiu Hagetaot in western Galilee, by the diarist.

Described as the "Polish Anne Frank Record" the 54-page ac-

cellar, together with 60 other Jews, was recently found by the young writer, now Lily Goldenduring berg, spring cleaning.
