Cards were expensive, however, so the Italians came up with a better solution. They placed the cards in a box which foiled most attempts at manipulating the deck. Since the box was made

of iron, it was called a "ferraro," and the word was corrupted to "faro" by the time the game was introduced to America at the European port of New Orleans.

The Imperial Palace's antique faro layout is in a plexiglass display case beside the show reservation desk in the casino.

**KVBC TV-3 To Show
"Amos 'N Andy:
Anatomy Of A Controversy"**

George Kirby, noted comedian and mimic, hosts this unusual look at an amazing chapter in American history. Commentary is provided by Redd Foxx, Marla Gibbs, Reverend Jesse Jackson, Rich Correll (son of co-creator Charles Correll), Ernestine Wade (Sapphire on both TV and Radio), Alvin Childress (Amos on TV), and NAACP representative Henry Lee Moon.

The story is told mainly through clips of the TV series, newsreel scenes of the radio stars, location scenes of historical sites, scenes of Amos 'N Andy memorabilia, and, above all, interviews with eyewitnesses.

An entire episode of the TV series, "Kingfish Sells A Lot," is condensed to give a true picture of what the series was like. Audiences who view this special will definitely know what the controversy was all about.

It has taken 18 years to bring Amos 'n' Andy back to television, even in this unusual form. CBS withdrew the series from syndication in 1966 and has, at present, no plans to re-release it. Only by careful examination of the motives and intentions of the present producers did CBS allow this limited amount of material to be shown, in the context of an historical documentary.

Israel Reports On Soldiers Wounded In Lebanon War

TEL AVIV (WNS) — About two-thirds of the 3,500 Israeli soldiers wounded in Lebanon during the past two years suffer permanent disabilities, according to Yaacov Maoz, chairman of the Disabled Soldiers Organization of the Israel Defense Force. He put their number at about 2,000.

Maoz spoke to reporters on the 10th anniversary of the establishment of Beit Haloem, the sports and rehabilitation facility for physically impaired former servicemen in Tel Aviv. He said about 400 of the wounded have a disability of 50 percent or more. The latter include five who are blind, more

than 30 who suffered brain damage and paralysis, and six soldiers who lost both legs.

Maoz pointed out that the IDF's definition of the gravity of a soldier's wounds is based on his chances of remaining alive, not the extent of his disability. In addition to the wounded, 580

Israeli soldiers, border policemen and civilian employees of the army died in Lebanon, Maoz said.

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
