There was one pleasant morning spent at the Tropicana driving range and putting green. This writer had the dubious distinction of standing beside the 125 yard-marker while the golfers aimed the small white sphere at the marker. They were either very good, or very bad, depending on your point of view. Most reached the circle around the mark without coming close to me. Then we moved to the putting green where Norman Kirk won first medal on the 9 hole green and Betty Crinite won first in the women's division.

During the entire eight days of the Olypics, the endurance of these seniors was most impressive. As an example, some of the 9 A.M. paddle tennis players were also entered in the early afternoon Jarts (Lawn Darts) at UNLV and just after that, the 440 yard dash. Now that is stamina.

More than just stamina, these seniors displayed strength, skill, accuracy, dexterity, enthusiasm and energy.

Flap Over New Political Party In Israel Appears Settled

JERUSALEM (WNS) list is held by Gen. (res.) Defense While Minister Moshe Arens believes the Jewish-Arab Progressive List for Peace to be subversive, he has taken no action to outlaw the party which hopes to participate in the July 23 Knesset elections.

According to Muhammed Miali, the Arab lawyer who heads the list, the party's platform calls for an independent Arab state to exist alongside of Israel, the latter reduced to its pre-June, 1967 borders.

A defense Ministry communique said Arens was convinced that key persons on the list have conducted themselves in a way that identifies with enemies of the State.

Matityahu Peled who has long been involved in anti-war movements and has met, outside Israel, with Palestinians associated with Palestine the Liberation Organization. The Progressive list is a combination of Israeli Arab nationalists and Jews of a leftist political persuasion.

The Defense Minister is permitted, under law, to ban any political party he deems to be a threat to national security. But Arens, on his return from a visit to Washington, decided not to take any action while the Central Elections Committee is considering the application by the Progressives to appear on the ballot.
