Teams and Junior previously Championships (7 p.m. qualifying Wednesday, July 18 two or more jugglers a fivepresenting minute routine. Juniors include jugglers 18 years old or younger presenting a threeminute routine. All competitive events are scored by a panel of judges, who award marks for stage presence and technical expertise.

Numbers Championships and Numbers Challenge (2:00 p.m. Thursday, July 19 - \$4) --Numbers Championship contestants are timed to see how long they can juggle without dropping five clubs, seven balls or seven rings. In the Numbers Challenge, the competitors who cessfully juggle the largest number of clubs, rings and balls will win.


