

### Boys Town Jerusalem Records Largest Number Of Graduates, 319 Students From Seven Schools, In Its 36-Year History

BAYIT VEGAN, Israel — Boys Town Jerusalem reported this week that it graduated 319 students in 1984, the largest number in its 36-year history.

Rabbi Moshe Linchner, dean of Boys Town, said the graduates included 52 students from its academic high school and 127 students from its four technical high schools of electronics, precision mechanics, graphic arts and furniture design. In addition, he said 118 students graduated from Boys Town junior high school, while another 22 graduated from its college of applied engineering.

While citing the record total as "a reflection of Boys Town's capacity to provide increasing numbers of students with a quality education," Rabbi Linchner took special

note of the fact that more than half the graduates of its five high schools are continuing their studies: 5 at yeshivot; 15 at Israeli universities, including the Technion, Jerusalem College of Technology and Tel Aviv University; 31 at Boys Towns college of applied engineering, and 40 in the Israel Army's five-year Hesder program combining military service with religious study.

This is particularly remarkable," he said, "not only because it far exceeds the national average among Israeli high schools but also because the vast majority of Boys Town students come from economically disadvantaged immigrant families, many of eight or more children, for whom post-high school study is the rare exception rather

than the rule.

"Moreover, it reaffirms Boys Town's philosophy that a residential campus community, where Torah learning is compatibly integrated with academic and technical training, creates a self-supportive social environment that encourages students to further their education," Rabbi Linchner said.

He also pointed out that the more than 100

junior high school graduates who will continue their studies at Boys Town's high schools this Fall "scored significantly higher on their entrance examinations than did some 200 students who are coming to our high schools from other institutions — so much so that we have had to formulate a more advanced curriculum for them."

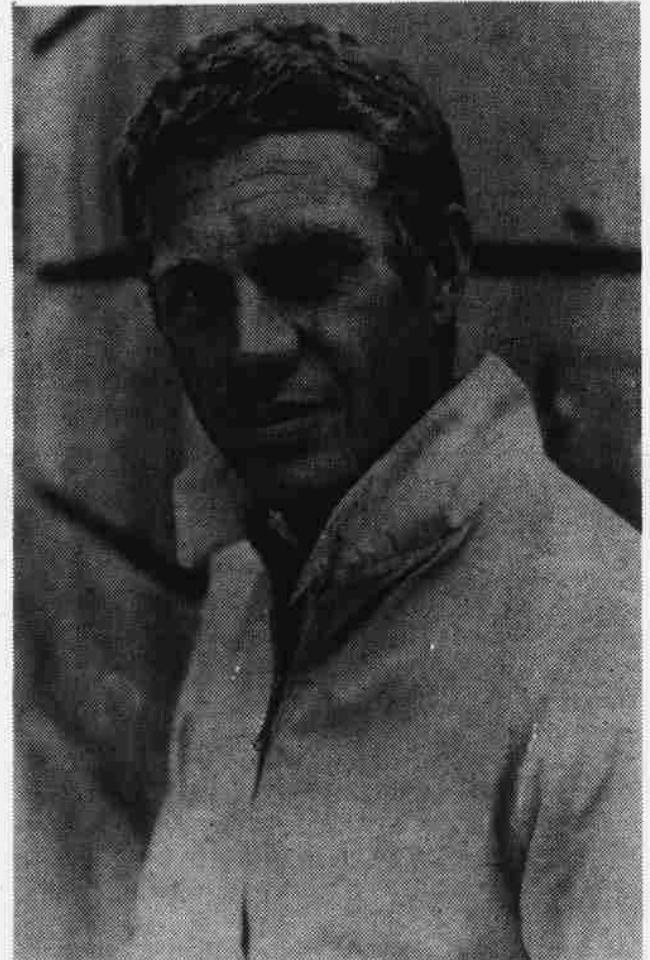

The long-awaited auction of the estate of actor Steve McQueen will be conducted by well-known auctioneer Don P. Britt at the Imperial Palace in Las Vegas. The estate will be previewed November 19-22, with the auction set for November 23-25 in the Imperial Theater of the Imperial Palace.

Steve McQueen died on November 7, 1980 at the age of 50. He left behind a legacy of film performances. He worked with the greatest actors in Hollywood as he perfected his skill and technique as an actor... "Never So Few" with Frank Sinatra, "The Magnificent Seven" with Yul Brynner, and "The Great Escape," with a cast that reads like "Who's Who" of American filmmaking.

He is remembered and revered for "Bullitt," "The Sand Pebbles" (with Candice Bergen), "Nevada Smith" (with Karl Malden), "The Thomas Crown Affair" (with Faye Dunaway, "The Towering Inferno" and "Papillon." The list goes on.
