Nevada Chief Justice Stresses Importance Of Continuing **Education To Fellow Jurists**

Nevada Supreme Court Chief Justice Noel Manoukian told fellow jurists that continuing education was essential if they are to meet their obligation and responsibility to the citizens of their jurisdictions.

Manoukian made the statement in a welcoming address to the 1984 class at the National Judicial College on the campus of the University of Nevada, Reno. Manoukian has welcomed each class at the college for the past several years.

"I am a firm believer in the importance of continuing education for today's trial and appellate judges," Manoukian said. "It is only through continuing education that we as jurists can learn of the constant changes in the law, plus share the knowledge of its applications in specific cases.

"We have an obligation and responsibility to the citizens of our jurisdictions to be the very best judges we can be, and it is only through continuing education programs, such as that offered here at the college, that we can meet that obligation and responsibility," Manoukian said.

Manoukian has served on the Nevada Supreme Court since 1977, and as Chief Justice since January 1983. He was a district court judge for four years prior to his appointment to the court, and was

re-elected to the post in 1978.

Manoukian has worked closely with the National Judicial College since 1975, and has continued to improve his knowledge of the law through many other professional education activities. These have included: member and chairman of the Nevada Judicial Education Council; attendance at the Southwestern Judicial Conference for the past eight years; and attendance at the American Bar Association Appellate Judges Seminar each year since 1979.

The birth of the group can be traced back through the Wilson family of Hawthorne, California. Mother Audrey Wilson played the organ at home and father Murry Wilson never lost touch as a songwriter. It was at home, while growing up, that the three brothers and cousin Mike would routinely harmonize together.

Brian admired the music of The Four Freshmen and Chuck Berry. He spent hours at the piano picking out part to songs. Brian would take the high parts and give the bass lines to Mike, the baritone to Dennis and the tenor to Carl, Jardine was a teammate of

Hawthorne High School football team and was soon invited to join the family group.

December of 1961, the boys felt the surfing craze beginning to unfold and "The Beach Boys" was born with the recording, "Surfin'."

The sounds of textured harmonies and hand-clapping rhythms have never faded in popularity. Those "California Sounds" are traveling with the same fervor among fans as they did way back in 1961.

Jewish Agency: Thousands Of Falashas Are In Israel

JERUSALEM (WNS) - The Jewish Agency confirmed for the first time that thousands of Falashas - Ethiopian Jews -- are in Israel. According to data released by its immigration and absorption department, about a quarter of Ethiopian Jews now lives in Israel, more than half of them under 18 and only five percent over 60 years of age.

This information was disclosed after reporters were taken on a tour of absorption centers in northern Israel by Haim Aharon, head of the immigration and absorption department. Aharon said the Agency changed its policy of not publicizing the Falasha presence in response to what he said were unfounded media reports about problems of Falasha immigrants.
