

Reagan And Mondale Vie For Jewish Vote

Israel Shifting South Lebanon Security To South Lebanon Army

transferring bility for security in Southern Lebanon to the South Lebanon Army (SLA), a force of some 2,000 soldiers, mostly Christians, commanded the late Col. Saad Hadby Gen. Antoine Lehad.

The Israel Defense handed over Force security duties to the SLA in Nabatiya, the third largest town in south Lebanon. Its 22,000 inhabitants are mostly Shiite Moslems, of them anmany tagonistic to Israel and to Maronite Christians. Israeli sources expressed hope that the Brig. Gen. Yehoshua move will ease friction in the town.

Despite its lowered profile in south Lebanon, the IDF would require 4-6 months to dismantle and repatriate its equipment from the region in the event of a political decision to withdraw, according to Cohen, commander of IDF Engineering the corps.

At B'nai B'rith Confab

WASHINGTON (WNS) - President Reagan and his Democratic challenger, Walter Mondale, made strong bids for Jewish votes in speeches to the 1.500 delegates attending the biennial convention of B'nai B'rith international, recently. Both men were interrupted frequently by applause.

Mondale's main theme was the injection of religion into politics. He accused the President of giving in to a "moral McCarthyism" by seeking to brand his political opponents as anti-religious.

Reagan, who used the occasion to announce that his Administration will now "vigorously support" U.S. ratification of the United Nations Convention against Genocide, spoke only briefly about the issue of separation of church and state and not at all about the issue of religion in politics.

His speech included a declaration of support of Israel, a rejection of anti-Semitism and quotas and a denunciation of the Sandinista regime in Nicaragua as anti-Semitic.

Mondale, who addressed the Jewish audience about three hours before Reagan, made a strong denunciation of bigotry and anti-Semitism. He declared, "All my life, I have fought anti-Semitism, racism and every other spiritual obscenity."
