The stage is set for an evening of superstar entertainment as the Las Vegas Hilton hosts the 18th Annual St. Jude's "Nite of Stars" on November 30 in the Grand Ballroom.

More than 1,100 people are expected to attend the event which annually features the largest array of stars ever assembled on a Las Vegas stage.

Henri Lewin, executive vice president of Hilton Hotels Corporation, will serve as general chairman for the dinner and show which benefits the St. Jude's Ranch for Children in Boulder City. All proceeds will be donated to the non-profit, non-sectarian residential care facility which provides aid and shelter to boys and girls who have been abused, abandoned or neglected.

Lewin will work in coordination with Father Herbert A. Ward Jr., executive director of St. Jude's, Patricia Hine, coordinating chairman, Claudine Williams, president of St. Jude's board of trustees and Perry Leiber Sr., member of St. Jude's board of trustees.

Weinberger Says Israel Will Get U.S. Help In Developing Lavie

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The United States has agreed to provide Israel with advanced military technology for the development of its second-generation jet fighter aircraft, the Lavie, according to Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger. Weinberger visited Israel for two days and met with high ranking Israeli officials, including his counterpart, Yitzhak Rabin.

Weinberger and others in the Reagan Administration had opposed providing Israel with certain technology, saying that it would become a direct competitor on the international market for U.S. weapons, such as the American-made Northrop F-20. The Northrop F-20, reports said, has not received Federal help. The U.S. has meanwhile earmarked \$500 million for the Lavie.

Israel is ready to produce a prototype of the Lavi, but has been stalled in this effort by Pentagon restrictions on the export of some advanced technology items that Israel ordered from U. S. manufacturers. These items include a tail assembly and details of the composition of a special material to be used in the wing of the Lavi, reports said.

Weinberger also indicated that the Reagan

Administration would consider meeting Israeli requests to buy three diesel submarines from the U.S. and to sell Israel-made 120 millimeter mortars

to the U.S. army. Weinberger also added that Israel and the U.S. agreed to form a joint working group to study Israel's submarine requirements and "proceed to some future solution." The Israeli navy is believed to have three an-

tiquated submarines that it wants to replace by the early 1990s, the reports here said.
