

Moreover, Israel's immediate cash needs will be met by the Administration's agreement to pay the entire \$1.2 billion in economic aid for fiscal 1985 in a lump sum now rather than in the usual quarterly installments. This money is a grant and need not be repaid.

The story from Washington IS somewhat different. Reagan Administration sources said October 16 that talk of a moratorium was inaccurate. State Department deputy spokesman Alan Romberg noted that under the law which provided U.S. loan aid to Israel "there can be late payment if viewed as necessary" with, of course, added interest charges. In short, Israel was told that a 90-day deferment of payment was a technical feasibility.
