Moulin Rouge Gives Dancer More Well-Rounded Experience

Linda May began her career as a dancer at a very early age with intense training in ballet. By the time she was 22, she realized that ballet could not fulfill her needs as a performer.

She needed to expand beyond the technical aspects which were so heavily emphasized in a highly schooled discipline like ballet

It was at this point, that May made her move to Las Vegas to work into a career in show business that left more room for growth.

May is now a principle dancer in the Las Vegas Hilton's stage production "Bal du Moulin Rouge," and she feels that the show has helped her to become a more "human, warm performer."

"I wanted to grow with my career. The end result for me is to become a completely wellrounded person and performer." she says.

'I go on intuition. I like doing things just to see if I can step out of the norm," she says.

May wants to expand her career into every aspect of performing so that she can become a well-balanced entertainer.

She works very hard at her craft and she takes it very seriously. In her apartment she has a dance studio and every month she travels to Los Angeles for classes in dance.

May is not sure what direction her career will take at this point but she does feel that she is on the right track.

Everything seems to be falling in the right place," she says.




