Zubin Mehta Honored At Technion Gala

Zubin Mehta was described by Gregory Peck as one of the "select greatest of the world's conductors" and by Otis Chandler as an "outstanding artist of our time" as he was presented with the American Technion Society's prestigious Albert Einstein Award at a tribute dinner held Sunday, January 6th at the Beverly Hilton Hotel.

Emcee Gregory Peck told the legendary story of how just before the 1967 Six-Day War, Mehta cancelled his own guest appearance and caught the last El Al flight to Israel, seated on crates of weapons and ammunition, to conduct the Israel Philharmonic. Sam Lewis, the pilot who flew the plane, was one of thirty Machal members, volunteers, who fought in the Six-Day War, who attended the gala.

Hundreds of leaders of Southern California's entertainment industry, philanthropy, the arts, and business rose to their feet to applaud Zubin Mehta, Music Director of the New York Philharmonic and Music Director for Life of the Israel Philharmonic, as he received the Einstein Award from Mr. Chandler.

Mr. Mehta remarked that it was difficult to accept the award "with a straight face" because "I am being honored for merely doing what I love to do as a musician." Zubin Mehta spoke eloquently of his love affair with Israel, "a young nation which will live for at least a thousand years." He had praise for the Technion and wished for the day when "all news about Israel's political and economic problems will be wiped out of every newspaper" and will be replaced by stories about Israel's flourishing culture and technology. He described Israel's tumultuous history as "volcanic eruptions which necessarily precede a stabilizing future."

Martin Kellner, President of the American Society for Technion - Israel Institute of Technology, discussed Israel's economic crisis and how it affected the Technion. He specifically mentioned a hiring freeze, decrease in government subsidy, and voluntary pay cuts among the teaching staff. Yet he stated that financial support of the Technion was vigorous and thanked everyone for their contributions.


Also on hand to officiate was Howard W. Koch, who served as General Chairman of the dinner.

Riviera Announces Holmes' Farewell

Championship Fight March 15, 1985



Undefeated heavyweight champion Larry Holmes will fight for the last time in his illustrious career when he defends his International Boxing Federation title against David Bey in "Perseverance -- The Grand Finale" on March 15 at the Riviera Hotel and Casino.

The 35-year-old Holmes, who began his procareer in 1973 and won his first world championship just five years later, has said the 15-round title bout against the unbeaten Bey will be the last time he enters the ring in earnest.

"We're delighted that the Riviera is the site of the final fight for one of the greatest champions of all time," said Arthur Waltzman, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Riviera Hotel and Casino. "Larry's always considered Las Vegas his 'second home,' so it's especially fitting that he conclude his brilliant career here."

The Holmes-Bey fight, however, is just one of three championship bouts on "Perseverance --The Grand Finale," promoted by Don King Productions, Inc., in association with the Riviera. Joining the 15-round main event will be former World Boxing Association heavyweight champion Michael Dokes against popular Randy (Tex) Cobb in another 15-rounder for the Continental Americas title and undefeated Mitch Green against world-ranked James Broad in a 12-rounder for the North American Boxing Federation heavyweight crown.

Also on "Perseverance -- The Grand Finale" will be a 10-round heavyweight bout between James (Bonecrusher) Smith and Tony Tubbs.

Holmes, from Easton, Pa., won his first world championship, the World Boxing Council version, in June, 1978, in Las Vegas by decisioning Ken Norton. Holmes last defended his IBF title in November at the Riviera, stopping Smith, to up his record to 46-0 with 32 knockouts.

The 27-year-old Bey, from Philadelphia, has a record of 14-0 with 11 knockouts. The current United States Boxing Association heavyweight champion, a title he won in August at the Riviera by beating current World Boxing Association heavyweight champ Greg Page, Bey is ranked No. 2 by the WBC and No. 3 by the WBA.

Dokes, from Miami, Fla., is ranked No. 4 by both the WBC and the WBA and has a record of 27-1-2 with 15 knockouts. Cobb, who calls Texas his home, has a record of 24-4 with 18 knockouts.

Green, from New York City, is ranked No. 8 by the WBC and has a record of 15-0-1 with 10 knockouts. Broad, originally from New Jersey but now living in Las Vegas, is ranked No. 9 by the WBC.

Smith, from Magnolia, N.C., has a record of 14-2 with 12 knockouts while Tubbs, from Cincinnati, is ranked No. 7 by the WBA and has a record of 18-0 with 13 knockouts prior to his bout Wednesday, Jan. 16, at the Riviera.

"Perseverance -- The Grand Finale" will be held in a specially constructed, 6,303-seat out-door arena adjacent to the Riviera on the southeast side. The card starts at 5:30 p.m. on March 15 with gates opening at 4.

Tickets, priced at \$50, \$100, \$150 and \$250, can be purchased 24 hours a day at the Riviera casino cage.

All television coverage of the card will be blacked out in Las Vegas.
