
New Tour Features England's Jewish Stately Homes



WADDESDON MANOR, ENGLAND: . The "Chateau" style Waddesdon Manor was built by the Rothschilds in the 19th century and is one of the highlights of a new tour of the British Isles sponsored by the American Jewish Congress' International Travel Program. The 12-day "Emerald Isle and England" tour features stays at Ashford Castle in Ireland, five nights in London and meetings with Jewish communities in Ireland and England.

Visits to two "Jewish" English stately homes are a highlight of a new tour to "The Emerald Isle and England," offered by the American Jewish Congress' International Travel Program.

Travelers will visit Waddesdon Manor, a 200acre estate whose vast Renaissance style "chateau" was built in the 19th century by Baron Ferdinand de Rothschild. The house, bequeathed in 1957 to Britain's National Trust, contains one of Europe's most sumptous collections of 18th century paintings, tapestries, porcelain and furniture.

The second "stately home" is Hughendon Manor, purchased by Benjamin Disraeli in 1848 and where he lived until his death in 1881. The Las Vegas Israelite

house contains numerous mementos of the travels, personal and political life of the legendary, Jewish-born Prime Minister. Among the paintings displayed, is a life-size portrait of Queen Victoria presented to Disraeli by "his grateful sovereign and friend."

Five departures are scheduled from May through September 1985. Other features of these 12-day American Jewish Congress tours are
