

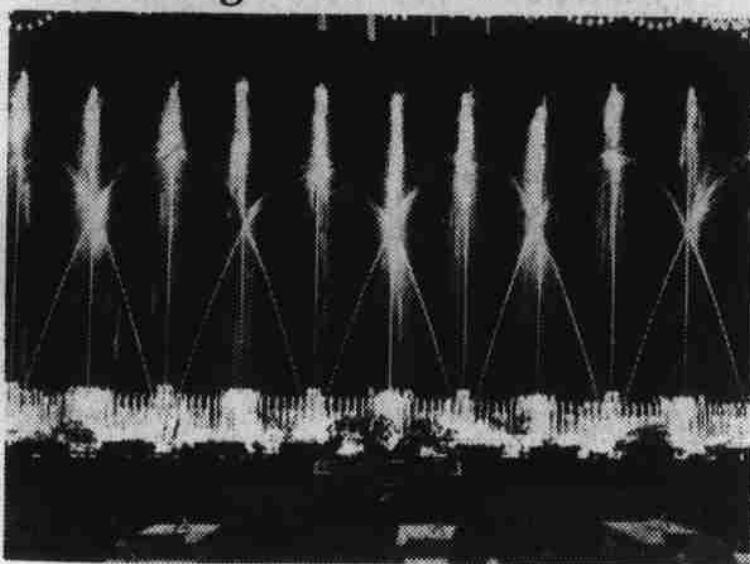
First Craps Tournament At New Landmark

U.S. Ready To Approve Increased Economic Aid To Israel

WASHINGTON (WNS) — The Reagan Administration appears to have approved an additional \$1.5 billion in economic aid which Israel had been seeking, but is not yet ready to make a formal announcement. There

is speculation the announcement could come after Secretary of State George Shultz arrives in Israel May 9.

In an interview with The Washington Post before leaving for Bonn, Shultz said, "I hope we'll be able to feel very soon that a positive response is called for. There hasn't been any conclusion yet within the Administration circles, but I think it's getting close."

When the question was raised at the State Department, deputy spokesman Edward Djerejian replied, "We have made clear in the past our support, in principle, for supplemental aid for Israel, Egypt and the West Bank and Gaza. We are in close touch with Congress on this subject. But we have nothing further to announce at this time."

Shultz's comments were more positive than previously when he had indicated that the United States still feels Israel has not done enough to solve its economic problems to warrant the \$1.5 billion supplemental aid beyond the \$3 billion the Administration has approved in military and economic aid, all of it grants, for the 1986 fiscal year.

According to reports, Shultz will also propose an additional \$8 million to improve the "quality of life" of Palestinians on the West Bank and Gaza. He has long urged the necessity to improve the conditions for the Arabs living in the territories.

Sammy Davis, Jr. And Bill Cosby Share Caesars Palace Stage Through May 20

LAS VEGAS, Nevada — Bill Cosby will share the spotlight with Las Vegas legend Sammy Davis, Jr. in the Caesars Palace Circus Maximus Showroom May 8-20 (dark 5/14).

Davis, whose name is synonymous with great showroom entertainment, has been heralded as one of the most complete entertainers of his time. A singer, actor, comedian, dancer and impressionist, he made the top of the recording charts with "Candy Man," "What Kind of Food Am I?" "I Gotta Be Me" and "Baretta." TV appearances include his own successful variety specials and guest spots on series like "Chico and the Man" and "All in the Family." More recently he performed in daytime dramas "General Hospital," "One Life to Live" and "Love of Live." (Sammy is an avid "soap" fan.) Broadway triumphs "Golden Boy" and "Stop the World, I Want to Get Off" were only a small part of a stage career that has brought his name to the top of the world's most illustrious marquees.

Bill Cosby returns to Caesars Palace with his television series, "The Bill Cosby Show," topping the Nielson ratings. Portraying an obstetrician who lives in New York with his wife and four children, the real life father of five draws his material from his own family experiences. And he follows the threat of his doctoral thesis on the effective use of media for educational purposes. That commitment to educate also spawned appearances on "The Electric Company" and Captain Kangaroo's "Wake Up" program, along with the creation of the animated "Fat Albert" series.

In every Cosby performance there is a common point of reference. Without resorting to gimmickry or low brow humor, he explores the humorous side of growing up and everyday family relationships. He built his career joking about his youth in a Philadelphia ghetto, where 20 guys on the block shared a broken-down auto, crashed parties, cowered from trouble and constantly scrimped around to raise the 19 cents they needed for a gallon of gas and the 14 dollars they needed for oil. And more than two decades later he hasn't lost the ability to see life through the eyes of young people.

The best-selling comedian on record, he has had 20 albums (3 of them musical) and 6 singles on the national pop charts. Seven albums have been certified gold. He has five Grammy awards for "Best Comedy Album."

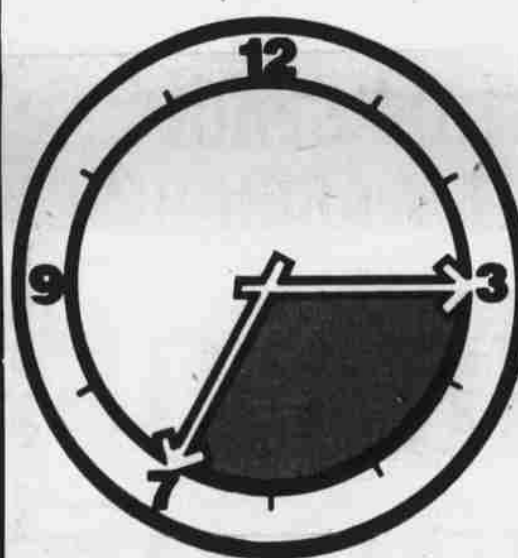

When Cosby and his pals yelled at the tops of their lungs under the Ninth Street Bridge, the echo could be heard for blocks. Now with his matured comedic style captured on record, film and television, those echoes can be heard around the world.
