A LAUGH-A-MINUTE - Zany, sharp-shooting comedian Rip Taylor is currently co-starring with Debbie Reynolds in "Bal du Moulin Rouge" at the Las Vegas Hilton. With a timing so unbelievably quick, he keeps audiences in stitches with his arsenal of bizarre props and way-out humor.

Rip Taylor doesn't have any dreams of becoming a big star like most performers. In fact, he's perfectly happy just playing the part of a "second banana" as he puts it.

Austria To Return Stolen Art To Jews

return to Jewish ownership all art works that were confiscated by the Nazis from Jews during World War II, according to WJCongress report.

Agreement on the return of the art was reached in a meeting between Austrian Foreign Minister Leopold Gratz and WJC Secretary General Israel Singer, Austrian Chancellor Fred Sinowatz telephoned during them their meeting to express his support for the return of the art to Jewish ownership. He confirmed that this was the understanding he had reached in a private with WJC meeting President Edgar Bronfman last January 29.

The confiscated art was given to Austria by U.S. military forces in 1955 on condition that Austria make "every effort to return the works to the extent they had not already done so" to the original owners or heirs. The art had been stored in a monastery. near Vienna since 1955. But many paintings and items other removed for placement in museums and other Austrian institutions.

Imperial Palace Hotel And Casino Announces Expansion

Ralph Engelstad, President and owner of the Imperial Palace Hotel & Casino, announced plans for a major expansion. A new tower will be constructed on the east side of the existing hotel. The addition will increase rooms at the Imperial Palace from the existing 1500 to 2100. Construction on the new tower is expected to begin in August.

The parking garage was expanded early in 1985 and now is one of the largest covered hotel parking facilities in Las Vegas. The fifth floor of the parking structure houses the Imperial Palace Antique & Classic Auto Collection. More than 200 vintage autos are on display in the gallerylike Collection.

With its increase in guest rooms, restaurants, and parking, the Imperial Palace will be better able to accommodate the hundreds of thousands of vacationers and business travelers, both American and foreign, who stay at the hotel each
