## Las Vegas Israelite

JERUSALEM — U.S. Senators Jesse Helms (R-N.C.) and Chic Hecht (R. Nev.) were guests recently at the Hecht Synagogue on the Mount Scopus campus of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem for a prayer service and breakfast honoring Sen. Hecht's brother, Martin Hecht, of Cape Girardeau, Mo., initiator of the campaign to build the synagogue.

Among those attending were the wives of the senators and Mr. Hecht, friends and acquaintances of the Hechts and Sen. Helms, University faculty members and officials, and students.

A special guest at the breakfast which followed the synagogue service was Minister of Religious Affairs Dr. Yosef Burg. Burg praised the Hechts for building the synagogue, which, he said, serves as a link in the chain of the Jewish tradition that is passed on from generation to generation as well as a link between the Jewish community in Israel and abroad.

Sen. Helms, in his remarks, described his "breathtaking experience" in Israel and expressed his wish that more senators visit the Golan Heights, as he did, in order to gain better insight into Israel's security problems. He said that Israel was "a little country filled with people with big hearts," and he praised Sen. Hecht for his love for Israel.

Sen. Hecht, recalling that his own mother

emigrated to the U.S. from Russia, said he hoped that the synagogue would serve as a beacon of hope for the 3 million Jews in the Soviet Union who cannot leave that country.

University Chancellor Avraham Harman, who presided at the breakfast, said that the event, coming at the end of the University's 60th anniversary celebrations, symbolizes the final rebuilding of the Mount Scopus campus.

Martin Hecht, in his response, recalled how 50 years ago his father, Louis Hecht, his brother, Chic, and a handful of other Jews in Cape Girardeau built a synagogue there, and that 15 years ago his son, Allan -- then a student at the Hebrew University -- had pointed out the need for a synagogue on Mount Scopus. That synagogue has now been built, said Hecht, at the highest point overlooking Jerusalem and the site of the Holy Temple.

He added his hope that "our prayers in this synagogue...will bring shalom (peace) a little sooner to us and the entire world."
