## The Right To Retaliate

Israel's daring and accurately executed air raid on PLO headquarters in Tunisia last week was a demonstration in fighting terrorism by going to the source. Despite the international outcry, which undoubtedly will ensue for public consumption, the raid was justifiable and was probably warmly received in many quarters.

The Palestine Liberation Organization, a group with plenty of Jewish blood on its hands, had boldly been claiming responsibility for recent attacks against Israel and Jews. The last straw was without doubt the murder of three innocent Israelis aboard a yacht in Larnaca, Cyprus on Yom Kippur. The PLO, for all its claims to the contrary, couldn't let the most solemn day of the Jewish year pass without murder.

There have also been recent increases in attacks on Jews in the occupied territories and attempts to infiltrate Israel for attacks from other area. Israel holds the PLO responsible for these actions, and has repeatedly vowed to strike back at the "source" of terrorism. In this case, the source was 1,500 miles away. President Reagan had it right when he said immediately after reports of the raid reached Washington that any country has the right to retaliate for terrorist attacks "as long as you pick out the people responsible."

### Moscow's Aim At World Harmony Without War

UNITED NATIONS (WUP) — Both the United States and the Soviet Union have had their say here last week as the general debate opened with heads of state and Foreign Ministers outlining their policies of their governments. The main "show" will be performed later this month with a gala event commemorating the 40th anniversary of the UN.

Judging by the speeches delivered by Secretary of State Shultz and the new USSR Foreign Minister Shevardnadze, the latter's one day after the former's, one may well understand why the new boss in Moscow, Mikhail S. Gorbachev, stated in a recent Time Magazine interview that "Time is passing, and it might be too late. The train might have already left the station."

This ominous reference must be understood in the light of two other remarks of his in the same interview, namely, "Relations between our two countries are continuing to deteriorate, the arms race is intensifying, and the war threat is not subsiding. What is the matter?" "I would like once again to tell all Americans the most impor-

tant thing they should know: war will not come from the Soviet Union. We will never start war."

He asks: "What is the matter?" And he assures Americans that "we will never start war."

The matter is plain and simple. Of course, the Soviets will never start a war. They need not do so to gain their objective of world hegemony. In their full knowledge of the fact that the United States has also pledged not to start a war, they feel free to continue on the path they have chosen, namely, piecemeal acquisition of lands near and far. This 'piecemeal' path has already 'acquired' Ethiopia, Afghanistan, Angola, Cuba; also, Syria in the Middle East and Libya in Africa, with PLO and other terrorists fomenting trouble in all parts of the globe readying the scene for Communist take-over.

Moscow does not need a war if its shrewd leaders can gain conquests in the manner they have so far while the U.S. and its NATO allies remain mute.

It is in this context that the keen observer must interpret Gorbachev's statement to the effect that "it might be too late" and that "the train might have already left the station." The "train" - Moscow's world scheme - is already on the move from Afghanistan toward the Gulf, from Ethiopia and Angola and Libya overwhelming Africa; from Eastern Europe toward the neutralization of West Germany, England and other Western states, and from Cuba and Nicaragua into the Latin states in Central and South America.

Indeed, the "train" has already left the station and, despite all the talk of co-existence emanating from Moscow and now heard at the UN is the lengthy speech of Shevardnadze, the Soviets will let nothing stop them from attaining their goals just as they have not let anyone stop them from oppressing and imprisoning the dissenters, especially their Jewish citizens, kept under their iron curtain.

Symbolizing the ruthless Soviet oppressive dictatorship and its treatment of its Jewish residents, was the appearance across the street from the UN during Shevardnadze's address of Avital Sharansky who staged her own 'General Assembly of Truth' from inside a prison cage. As the Soviet Foreign Minister speaks, she stated, "so will I - I will speak the truth about my husband's suffering. I will speak the truth about the other Prisoners of Conscience in the Gulag; about the brave unofficial teachers of Judaism in Russia who face the KGB's wrath; about some 400,000 Jews who have defied the Kremlin by asking to return to Israel."

This brave lady was pleading for the release of her world-famous scientist husband Anatoly Sharansky. "Tyrannies of all sorts have been known on earth, but until our day it has been virtually unheard of for any regime, no matter how despotic, to deny that most elementary of all political alternatives, the right to leave," she noted the same erev Yom Kippur day in a Times article. "Even Nazi Germany in the years before World War II grudgingly allowed free

emigration..."

The question now facing the world: Is the die cast?

The answer will come next month when President Reagan meets with Gorbachev in a Geneva summit meeting.

treatment of respiratory, allergic and immunological diseases, which include asthma, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, tuberculosis, occupational and environmental lung disease, and juvenile rheumatoid arthritis. National Jewish has cared for patients from every state in the nation; Nevada residents have received more than 13,000 days of care at the Center.

"Lung disease is the third leading and fastest-rising cause of death in America," said Mike O'Callaghan, former governor of Nevada and a National Jewish trustee, "and National Jewish is the only institution in the country focusing its complete resources on lung disease, as well as allergic and immune disorders.

"The Center is at the leading edge in research and patient care," O'Callaghan continued. "Its studies are directed at finding the causes and cures of these diseases and pioneering cost-effective methods of treatment and rehabilitation.

"These methods have been found to reduce the amount of medical care that National Jewish patients require after discharge. Of course, this means happier, more productive lives for people, in addition to lower medical costs," he added. "Since National Jewish is a teaching hospital, these methods are taken back to communities around the country and around the world by the physicians and researchers who have been trained at the Center."

Gov. Bryan has a long career of public service that began with his appointment as Nevada's first public defender in 1966. He later served as deputy district attorney in Clark County, state assemblyman and state senator. From 1978 to 1982, he was state attorney general and, in 1982, was elected Nevada's chief executive.

He is a member of the National Governors' Association, serving on the economic development and technological innovation committee, the human resources committee and the sub-committee on tourism.

The governor gives his time to a number of statewide charitable organizations, including serving on the board of directors of the Nevada March of Dimes and the Boy Scouts of America. He has also been state telethon chairman for the Muscular Dystrophy Association since 1979.

Mrs. Bryan has led an active role in community affairs for years. She currently serves on the boards of the American Lung Association, Camp Fire Girls, Foster Youth Services, Sierra Arts Foundation, Nevada State PTA and the University of Nevada-Reno Alumni Association.

She has also done volunteer work with Junior Mesquite, Junior League of Las Vegas, and the steering committee of the Assistance League of Las Vegas.

William S. Boyd, president of The Boyd Group, is chairman of the October 20 dinner and David DiMasio, controller of the California Hotel, is treasurer for the event.
