> It would also investigate the nature and extent of deception and law-breaking said to have been committed by U.S. intelligence agency officials in an effort to bring former Nazis and collaborators to this country, and more recently, in an alleged attempt to cover up the entire affair.

> The call for an independent commission follows the pletion by the General Accounting Office (GAO) of its second investigation into the question of U.S. intelligence involvement in bringing former Nazis and collaborators into the country. The report was immediately criticized by Elizabeth Holtzman, Brooklyn District Attorney, as "painfully limited and inadequate," and her criticism was endorsed by numerous Jewish groups.
