# 2 IDF Soldiers Killed And 2 Wounded

tral region, told reporters later that it was too early to implicate the Jordanian army in the incident or to say whether Jordan has changed its policy of many years to prevent incursions against Israel from Jordanian soil. He noted that the Jordan Valley has been quiet since 1981.

Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Chief of Staff Gen. Moshe Levy visited the scene of the clash. An account was sent to Premier Shimon Peres who is presently visiting West Germany.

Meanwhile IDF sources said that the infiltrator was a deserter from the Jordanian army. He has been identified as Nasser Ibrahim Abdel Aziz, 20.

The IDF has revealed that two other Jordan army deserters had been arrested on the West Bank three weeks ago, after having infiltrated across the Jordan River to seek sanctuary in the West Bank. Both had been discovered in Nablus, and one of them is reported to have been implicated in the stabbing of an Israeli on the West Bank about six months ago, fleeing to Jordan afterwards, where he joined the Jordan army but then deserted to return to his home.

Army sources discount the possibility that he had been aided or abetted by the Jordanian authorities or with their knowledge. It is stressed that the Jordanians have for months and even years been intent on halting infiltrators from Jordan into Israel to reduce the chances of friction.

Senior IDF officers said they did not believe that the incident signalled a change in Jordanian policy. It was rather regarded as an isolated event, the exact circumstances of which were still far from clear.

Chief of Staff Lt. Gen Moshe Levy told a public meeting in Haifa that there was no connection between the Jordan Valley clash and the IDF air raid on terrorist bases in Lebanon. The Sidon attack, in fact, took place a few minutes before the Jordan incident, he said.

Prime Minister Shimon Peres referred to the Jordan Valley clash when he spoke to newsmen on his return home from a 12-day official visit to Europe. Asked if the incident and the air raid could affect the peace process with Jordan, Peres said: "I don't think it has affected the peace process at all, because the Israeli position is well known -- while trying to achieve peace we shall continue to fight against terrorism. If somebody wants Israel to stop fighting terrorism, they should stop terrorism. But as long as there will be acts of terrorism we will take the necessary measures to prevent it, to stop it, and to punish," Peres said.

According to Israeli officials, indirect word was received from Jordan through the United States that the infiltrator who killed the two Israeli soldiers was not sent by Jordan. The report further said that Jordan reaffirmed its policy of preventing infiltrations across the Jordan River.
