The last time I sawa Senator Jacob Javits was about two years ago at the College of New Rochelle. I had the special privilege of sharing a platform with him when that Catholic college awarded its Pope John XXIII Peace Medal to Senator Javits and myself, among others.

Jack Javits then made a brief statement about the importance of achieving peace between the superpowers. Far more important than what he said was the experience of watching how he said it. Struggling against the wasting of his body inflicted by the degenerative Lou Gehrig's disease, he sat uncomfortably in his wheel chair, yet spoke with determination. His respirator was at his throat and a nurse was at his side. His incredible will to live filled that entire hall. That powerful life force, to live in the face of all adversity, to contribute to the well-being of America and all her citizens, dominated his entire life, from the tenements of the lower East Side in New York to his brilliant career as U.S. Senator.

I once asked Senator Javits why he seemed to be always so serious, so dignified. And he answered without hesitation, "Rabbi, of course, I'm always serious. I feel that I represent the dignity of the Jewish people in the U.S. Senate. That's
