Passover Thoughts

More than forty years have passed and the frightful events of the Hitler era recede slowly into history. But the grip they have on all those who survived has never lessened and will never be forgotten. Every Passover when we talk about freedom, the picture of those events stands out in all its vivid intensity.

It seems so long ago that we sat at the Seder table in a small German town. We did not talk much. We were overwhelmed by the sequence of happenings, blow after blow; it seemed never to end. A wave of unprecedented hatred was engulfing us all. We hardly grasped its impending message of death and destruction.

There was not much to celebrate at that Seder table. The words of the Haggadah had assumed a strange sound. We could not say "Every generation should feel as if they went out of Egypt." For us it was the reversal of it all -- not from bondage to freeedom, but from freedom to bondage. We were the Pariahs. We had lost our freedom.

More than forty years later, a new generation has taken hold and commands events in its own way. A new way of life brings the opportunities we all craved for. There is much to celebrate this Passover 5746 in the freedom of a blessed country. The words of the Haggadah have assumed their original meaning. A new generation has grown up in freedom. There is freedom from want. The fear that once grasped our throats is not known to them. Freedom has become more than a promise.

But for me, in the midst of all the celebrating,

there is still the nagging and almost tantalizing question: What have we done with this new freedom? Have we made proper use of it? Did we, as a group, here and in Israel, use freedom for the benefit of our people?

There was never so much disunity, never so much irresponsibility in our midst. All sorts of extremists claim the spot light. Do-gooders raise their voices. Minds are closed. Positions have hardened. A growing intolerance cuts off dialogue and the sense of belonging. The middle ground between the political right and left, between ultra-orthodox and reform has been eroded. There is polarization and fanaticism on all sides of the political and religious spectrum, here and in Israel. Headlines and photos showing Jew against Jew testify to an alarming situation.

Everyone regrets this state of affairs, but very little is done to rectify it.

For me - these are trying times. There is a lump in my throat and my blood pressure exceeds its limits. Has freedom clouded the minds of people and created an over-abuindance of selfishness and a retreat from responsibility?
