
Photography Student At Hadassah Community College Awarded Outstanding Student Of The Year Prize For 1986 By The Israel Professional Photographers Association





Prizes for the outstanding Student of the Year 1986 were awarded by the Israel Professional Photographers Association to Yoram Bouzaglo, a second year photography student at Hadassah Community College in Jerusalem.

Jerusalem...Yoram Bouzaglo, a second year student in photography at the Hadassah Community College, was awarded the 1986 prize for Outstanding Student of the Year by the Israel Professional Photographers Association.

The award, which carries a \$600 cash prize, was open to students throughout Israel.

A 25-year-old sabra and a veteran of the war in Lebanon, Bouzagio won for photographs selected from two of his series: "the world of the earth and the unreality of the sky"; and a second series illustrating "togetherness." He says that the choice of his themes might be a reaction to his experience in Lebanon.

After graduation this year he hopes to combine work in a commercial studio with producing

hundreds of students in all forms of photography since it inaugurated Israel's first training course in photography in 1970.

Eastern Airlines Tells AJCongress It Will Drop Arab-Owned 'Third World Magazine' From Flights

Eastern Airlines says it will no longer make the magazine South available to its passengers as part of its in-flight library.

A complaint lodged with the airline by the American Jewish Congress charged the Arabowned publication with being "devoted almost exclusively to maligning Israel and the United States."

A letter of reply from Donald F. Lohr, an Eastern official, said that the complaint from AJCongress and others "have convinced us to discontinue boarding this publication."

The South which calls itself "The Third World Magazine," recently described Yasir Arafat as "one of the great freedom fighters of our time," according to AJCongress, which noted that Arafat personally had ordered the assassination of the U.S. ambassador to Sudan in 1973 as well as other terrorist acts.

The complaint to Eastern, which was signed by Phil Baum, associate executive director of AJCongress, asserted that the kind of propaganda contained in South "is slanted, mendacious and highly offensive to many passengers."

Mr. Baum noted that AJCongress does not want to censor the magazine and that "we unreservedly support South's right to be published and to be sold anywhere in the world." nography or "blatant political propaganda."
