JERUSALEM (WNS) — An Israeli Defense Force spokesman announced the capture of a terrorist gang believed responsible for 29 attacks in northern and central Israel during the past year. The suspects belong to the mainstream Fatah wing of the PLO, the IDF said.

They are held responsible for placing 10 booby-trapped devices in Haifa and 10 others in Afula. An explosive charge that detonated near a gasoline station in that Jezreel Valley town was the 10th bombing there in 12 months. Other charges were placed by the gang in a half dozen

Holocaust Must Never Happen Again, Donahue Tells 5,000 At Sutton Place

The two exchanged views on a broad array of domestic and international topics before an overflow audience of 5,000 persons who watched in the synagogue's main auditorium and on closed-circuit TV. With loudspeakers beaming the discussion to crowds gathered outside the synagogue, Donahue declared: "The atrocity of the Holocaust must never happen again." He urged continued demonstrations to call attention to the plight of Soviet Jewry.

NEW YORK — Terming his feelings while visiting Dachau to film NBC-TV's forthcoming series on the Holocaust "a communion with the

Why The Saudi Arms Sale Will Stabilize The Middle East

On May 6, 1986, I voted against the proposed sale of arms to Saudi Arabia. I was disappointed in the response the Saudi's had made following our retaliation against terrorists attacks from Libya. The Republican-controlled Senate voted 73 to 22 against the sale and the House of Representatives followed suit, 356 to 62. However, President Reagan stressed the importance of the sale in broader terms when he exercised his veto.

The veto cast the arms sale in a new light. The question became much larger. The very prestige of the Presidency of the United States was at stake. President Reagan removed the controversial stinger missiles from the package, which helped change some minds. But after much deliberation I decided that the interests of Israel and American foreign policy could best be served by standing by our Chief Executive as he struggles to wage peace in the Middle East.

On June 5, the Senate entered into its final debate on the Saudi Arms sale and I outlined my reasons for voting to sustain the President's veto:

"The President of the United States is making progress with the moderate Arab states in negotiating for peace in the Middle East. I feel a rebuff of the President would be a step in the wrong direction. It would promote consequences far worse than an arms sale three years in the future with weapons Saudi Arabia now has and which pose no overall threat to Israel.

"Since becoming President, President Reagan has demonstrated that he has been one of the best, if not, the best friend Israel has had in the White House. Iran, Syria, and Libya all are a threat to Saudi Arabia. President Reagan must be allowed to continue to bring the Arab moderate states closer to America and the free world, and not send them in the direction of the Soviet Union which has supplied many, many billions of dollars in arms to Libya and Syria.

"On May 21, 1986, I met personally with President Reagan and Admiral Poindexter, and told them of my decision to back the President on this vote. I then asked if I might bring up two concerns that were on my mind. President Reagan graciously agreed, and I stated that I feel that the nearly \$2 billion annually that Israel pays in interest to the United States at an average
