

Imperial Palace Hotel & Casino To Host Rare Coin Auction July 12, 1986



The Imperial Palace Hotel & Casino will host a rare coin auction to be held Saturday, July 12. G. Robert Deiro, Rare Coin Auctioneer, compares the size of two (2) American coins. The one on the viewers left is one of the largest coins struck in the United States, the popular Morgan Silver Dollar. The coin on the right is one of the smallest coins the United States struck, the 1851 New Orleans Gold Dollar. Both are examples of the over 500 rare coins to be sold at the rare coin auction.

Robert Deiro and Associates, a general auctioneering company licensed throughout the United States will hold an auction of rare coins from a major collection at the Imperial Palace Hotel & Casino on Saturday, July 12, 1986. The event will begin at 1:00 p.m. in Royal Hall B.

Some 500 coins parceled into 300 lots will be put under the hammer. The coins will be displayed for grading under high-intensity lights by prospective buyers from 11:00 a.m. until the auction's commencement at 1:00 p.m. Magnifying glasses and catalogs will be provided.

The coins will be offered without fixed reserves. Prices will be determined solely by verbal bidding, with no minimum bids. Terms are cash, personal or business check with bank card as well as Visa, MasterCard and American Express for the full purchase price at the time of the sale. Registration will require positive identification in the form of a driver's license or equivalent. There will be no entrance fee.

Previous rare coin auctions staged around the country, according to company president G. Robert Deiro, have elicited a "surprising response by investment-minded people who have developed a lively interest in the coin market." Investors, as distinguished from collectors, "are attracted to coins because of their liquidity, because their values are established daily on nationwide retail wire networks and in the trade press and because of their tremendous long-term investment performance."

Deiro also noted that United States rarities, particularly American gold and silver, have been the most consistently popular with bidders. The top sellers list includes gold coins in denominations ranging from \$1 to \$20 minted until 1933 and the Morgan and Peace dollars that contain nearly a full ounce of silver. Several of the Morgans have enjoyed heady capital appreciation through the years, he reports, with the

1893 Carson City dollar in common circulation now going for \$8,000 and the 1895 Philadelphia Morgan, a numismatic rarity, valued at more than \$30,000. Deiro sold one of the latter in the second auction he conducted on behalf of his collector client.

Some of the numismatic rarities to be sold at the rare coin auction at the Imperial Palace include: a brilliant uncirculated 1907 Roman Numeral High Relief American \$20.00 Gold Piece valued at approximately \$10,000, several rare date American silver dollars such as the 1893CC Morgan Dollar in brilliant uncirculated condition which could bring a price as high as \$8,500, an 1884S Morgan Dollar which in the higher grades can bring as high as \$22,500. There will also be a wide selection of proof coins in various denominations such as Barber Dimes and Quarters, Seated Liberty Dimes, Quarters and Trade Dollars. Also on the auction block will be a selection of over 75 American Gold Coins including the \$2.50, \$5.00, and \$10.00 Indian varieties and the \$2.50, \$5.00, \$10.00, and \$20.00 Liberty versions of American Gold Coins. Additionally, there will be several rare uncirculated Silver Dollar rolls consisting of twenty coins, all of which are the same date and mint mark. There will be brilliant uncirculated rolls of 1890S and 1904P Morgan Dollars and 1926S Peace Dollars.

As the exclusive contractor for one collector, Deiro states his company does not auction coin rarities for any other individual, organization or group. Members and associates of the firm do not collect or trade in coins. Specie selected for auction are brought to the site by, and remain in the custody of the collector at all times.

Deiro reports he is a member of the Certified Auctioneer Institute, a professional designation awarded by Indiana University. He is a graduate of the Missouri Auction School, a member of the National Auctioneers Association, a past president of the Nevada Auctioneers Association and a recent appointee of the California Auctioneers Commission. The company is headquartered in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Famous Tel Aviv Movie House Destroyed By Fire

TEL AVIV (WNS) — roof was slowly rolled aside to allow the air to circulate. Tel Aviv's Mograbi Cinema, one of the oldest in the city and a famous landmark at the corner of Allenby Road and Ben Yehuda Street, was gutted by fire.

The blaze broke out in the upper balcony area, when the building was empty, shortly after the second show of the evening had ended. The roof of the building collapsed during the fire-fighting operations. Next morning only a charred empty shell remained. Firemen managed to prevent the blaze from spreading to the basement studio cinema, but the smaller lower-level movie house was damaged by water seeping through the ceiling from the fire-fighting deluge above.

The Mograbi Cinema, built 54 years ago, was the first movie house in Palestine -- and possibly in the Middle East -- to be erected with a sliding roof. This was a welcome innovation in the hot Mediterranean climate in the days before air conditioning. When darkness fell the
