Paul Fisher: Better Treatment For Nation's Elderly



Democratic Candidate for Congress Paul Fisher has pledged an all-out effort to better the lives of senior citizens in the fields of health care costs and services, more opportunities for employment, and improvements to include higher benefits in the Social Security System.

Fisher, a successful businessman who turned a dream and hard work into a major corporation, Fisher Pen Co., headquartered in Boulder City, said that the nation's elderly "have been neglected far too long," often resulting in misery and deprivation for millions of Americans who deserve better.

"Health care costs are a disaster," Fisher said, "a national shame that reflects the inability or unwillingness of Congress to put the brakes on the multi-million-dollar profits racked up by health care providers at the expense of millions of senior citizens, many of whom cannot afford even the Medicare deductible."

John Moran Seeks Re-Election



Vowing to continue his war on crime, John Moran seeks a second term as Sheriff of Clark County.

"In the first three years of our administration we've seen a big decrease in many areas of crime," said Moran, "but I'm still not satisfied. I want every criminal and would-be crook in the county to understand we mean business in Clark County. This is a family oriented community and our residents have every right to expect security

and reductions or weakening of the Social Security System "Absolutely cannot be tolerated," Fisher said, "and in fact, benefits should and can be increased without additional burden on the American taxpayers, simply by the exercise of sound business practices and financial judgment at the federal level."

"We are the world's richest and most productive nation, yet we continue to force many elderly to exist at a poverty level, denied adequate housing, medical care and other necessities of life -- even food on the table," the candidate declared.

Fisher, who is now 72, and "in the prime of life," strongly opposes mandatory retirement because of age. "We are closing the door on our country's vast resources of wisdom and experience when we force an end to employment merely because a man or woman has reached a certain chronological state in life. It's a fact that many of the world's greatest accomplishments throughout history have been achieved by men and women well beyond what we consider to be the right age to step down from one's life's work."

"In all too many ways, this country's treatment of its elderly citizens -- the very people who have given our nation its greatness -- is shabby, disgusting, shameful, and very, very saddening. This can and must be changed."

Fisher concluded, "For too long, others have talked about the problems. Now it's time that we elect to public office those who know the solutions and who will work toward them."

and protection from the criminal element. "Without going into volumes of statistics," said Moran, "neighborhood crime was and is a top priority with our administration. Robbery is down almost 35% in three years and burglary is down 24%.

Prostitution, another major thrust of Moran's crime attack, is down a gigantic 60% since he took office. Personal felony crimes related to prostitution, such as theft, are down 83%.

Sheriff Moran further stated that, "In spite of our tremendous growth, almost 70,000 people in the last three years, along with a two million visitors a year increase in our tourist traffic...we can all be proud of the men and women of Metro for their great effort in crime reduction. In 1979, Las Vegas was ranked 1st in major crimes. Three years ago Las Vegas ranked 4th in major crime -- today we are 15th," added Moran. "The credit rightfully belongs to our whole department, including all our support personnel.

"It really does take a dedicated team to get meaningful results in crime reduction, and I would be remiss if I didn't give a special thanks to the men and women of our foot and car patrol units along with our special teams. These people are in the trenches. They've done a remarkable job under very tough circumstances.

"Lots of people don't realize the FBI statistics don't include our tourist traffic," said Moran, "yet the police department has to deal with almost 14 million tourists a year in addition to our growing population of almost 570,000. That's why I'm so proud of our people. Their efforts are outstanding and I don't believe they ever get the credit they truly deserve.

"I'd also like to point out in my three years as Sheriff we've had great cooperation from our criminal justice system. The District Attorney's Office and our judges have all displayed an aggressive, get-tough attitude. We've also had a tremendous surge of community involvement. Our Neighborhood Watch and Secret Witness programs have been very effective in helping Metro and even more important - helping themselves.

"I think another important reason for the reduction in overall crime can be attributed to the special teams I mentioned earlier. These teams have cracked down hard on ringleaders and big operators who traffic in drugs and stolen property. Our special teams are not only making major arrests and convictions, they're putting the fear of God into lots of other criminals who've decided to go elsewhere.

"I think the bottom line on our first term is simple. We've made a strong dent, but I believe we can do a lot more. When I first ran for office in 1982, I promised a war on crime. We started that war in 1983 and as long as I'm Sheriff, it's not going to stop."

Moran, a 30-year police veteran, has resided in Las Vegas, with his wife, Goldie, since 1948.
