Free screening for the eye disease glaucoma is available to anyone over the age of 35 at the District Health Center, 625 Shadow Lane, Las Vegas.

Glaucoma is an eye disease that can lead to blindness. According to public health officials, it affects 2 percent of the population of southern Nevada. Symptoms of the disease include frequent changes of glasses, all of which are unsatisfactory; inability to adjust to darkened rooms, loss of side vision, blurred or foggy vision and rainbow-colored rings around lights. But it is possible to have glaucoma without any of these symptoms.

Persons with a family history of glaucoma should be checked regularly. The chance of developing this disease increases with age.

The five-minute test for glaucoma is simple and painless. Screening is offered two Fridays each month by appointment at the District Health Center of the Clark County Health District. Appointments can be scheduled by calling 383-1354.
