produce, to do everything necessary to keep our production base.

Q: Did you discuss with Israeli leaders the espionage charges against Jonathan Pollard?

A: Yes I did. But it's better not to comment on that. I made clear that the relationship between Israel and the U.S. is strong, and should overcome that difficulty, but the U.S. must enforce its laws.

Q: And what about the theft of those cluster bombs?

(allegations that Israelis were seeking to divert a technology that was denied them following their use of cluster bombs in Lebanon).

A: I did discuss those allegations. Some Israelis feel there is a vendetta against Israel. I don't think so. But our Justice Department is determined to fulfill its obligations, to support our own laws.

Q: You planned to meet with (former Israeli Prime Minister) Menachem Begin on this visit. Why was that cancelled?

A: I don't know the reason. It probably wasn't convenient for him, but I would have been delighted to have met with him. I did speak with him on the telephone, and we had a good conversation. Mr. Begin is a great man and he made a major contribution to world peace. Our talk was upbeat and positive and I had a chance to express appreciation for the steps he took toward peace. (Mr. Begin was prime minister of Israel in 1979 when Mr. Bush made his first trip there).

Q: How would you describe the three leaders you just met in their own countries?

A: I have a personal relationship with each one.

Shimon Peres is a very strong and courageous leader. His recent trip to see Morocco's King Hassan got tremendous support.

I've always had great respect for King Hussein. I believe he does want to come to the peace table, one way or another. His life has been at risk since the day he was born, and yet he con-

tinues to lead his country in a courageous way. President Mubarak is a man who I think wants to continue in the tradition of Sadat. Egypt has enormous economic problems and Mr. Mubarak is determined to better the lives of his people. To do that, he needs financial support. He has received a substantial amount from the U.S. but he is interested in seeing further financial relief.

Egypt is a very, very important country in the region. There is no way one can discuss a stable and peaceful Mideast without having a strong, and I'd say, a pro-United States Egypt. It is in our interest to do what we can to be sure Egypt remains the kind of friend it is under President Mubarak.

Q: How would you sum up?

A: This trip has strengthened my views and perceptions: My knowledge of the Mideast issues has been enhanced. I've been there several times, and each time I understand better the diversity of the area and the different ways the issues are perceived.

I think I have a clear picture of the Middle East. The United States has an important catalytic role in bringing peace there. I do worry about Soviet expansionism. I am convinced Israel is our strongest ally and closest friend in that region. I'm also convinced that we need close relations with Jordan, Egypt, the G.C.C. countries and others in that area.

Q: And, finally, how to you reply to critics who say you traveled to the Mideast only for political gain?

A: I think I'll let the results of my trip stand on their own merits. I know that a number of Mideast experts and the three chiefs of state with whom I met, said the trip was useful from a substantive standpoint.

It is disturbing to read about political 'cheap shots' taken at me, but I can't control what people say.
