**5 Nepalese UNIFIL Soldiers
Wounded In SLA-Shiite Crossfire**

TEL AVIV (WNS) — A serious clash between Israeli-backed South Lebanon Army (SLA) troops and Shiite militiamen was reported, in the course of which five members of the Nepalese contingent of UNIFIL were wounded by crossfire.

The Shiite militia involved in the clash were apparently from the Amal and the extremist pro-Iranian Hizbullah

factions. In the assault on the SLA post near Bint Jball, some 10 kilometers north of the Israeli border, two SLA men were killed and three wounded. The attackers lost three killed and four wounded.

The Hizbullah group captured an SLA armored personnel carrier and evacuated their dead and injured on it, later parading it through the streets of

LAS VEGAS, NV. — He's Clint Carvalho, creator, producer, director and star of "Carvalho's Exotic Bird Revue," now firmly entrenched as one of the Tropicana Resort and Casino's most popular attractions.

UNIFIL headquarters at Nakoura in South Lebanon reported that a Nepalese unit had been trapped in the area in which the exchange of fire occurred, and five of them were wounded, two of them seriously.

The IDF was not implicated in the fight in any manner.
