
Bruce B. Teicholz, World War II Resistance Hero, To Be Honored By ORT October 30

Featured in NBC Mini-Series "Wallenberg: Lost Hero"



Bruce B. Teicholz, President of Woodhole Realty Company and Chairman of the New York ORT Scholarship Fund, will be the guest of

In making the announcement, Glick noted: "It is a privilege to honor Bruce B. Teicholz, a man who has worked tirelessly on behalf of ORT and heroically on behalf of the Jewish people for more than 40 years. As Chairman of the New York ORT Scholarship Fund for the past decade, he has been the driving force behind our chapter's successful scholarship drives to assist students at ORT schools around the world."

Born in Poland, Teicholz was a leader of the Resistance in Budapest from 1942 to 1945. His work with Swedish diplomat Raoul Wallenberg, saving thousands of Hungarian Jews from the Nazis, was portrayed in the widely acclaimed NBC mini-series "Raoul Wallenberg: Lost Hero." Accounts of his activities have been published in a dozen books dealing with the period.

After the war he worked in Vienna with the Bricha, the underground railway for "illegal" immigrants from war-ravaged Europe to Palestine. Combining this clandestine role with his position as president of the International Committee for Jewish Inmates and Refugees from Concentration Camps in Vienna, he was instrumental in spiriting over 275,000 Holocaust survivors past the British blockade to freedom in then-Palestine. In recognition of his achievements the State of Israel presented him with the Ot Haganah Medal of Valor.

He became the first chairman of the reorganized ORT in postwar Vienna. His work with ORT continued after his arrival in the U.S. and today he is Vice President of the American ORT Federation, Chairman of the American ORT Budget and Finance Committee, and has been Chairman of the highly successful New York ORT Scholarship Fund drive for the past ten years. In addition, he is a member of the Board of Directors of the Bramson ORT Technical In- Tomi and Debby.

Unique Project Unites Jewish, Christian Groups, Three Governments To Build New Zaire Hospital

NEW YORK — A unique partnership of Jews and Christians continents apart and the governments of three nations is building a modern 180-bed hospital in Kinshasa, Zaire, it was announced jointly by the United States Agency for International Development and Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America.

A.I.D. Administrator M. Peter McPherson and Hadassah National President Ruth W. Popkin announced that the hospital will serve 150,000 residents. The facility is under construction on the site of a small hospital run by the Kimbanguist Church, a Christian sect. The original hospital was founded in 1973 and was the first to be built in Zaire since the nation achieved independence in 1960.

The new hospital is a joint project of A.I.D., the Hadassah Medical Organization, the Kimbanquist Church and the governments of Israel and Zaire. A \$1.5 million A.I.D. grant will complete construction and the equipping of the hospital. The International Cooperation Department of the Israel Foreign Ministry will pay expenses of volunteer Hadassah Medical Organization medical personnel from Israel who will work with the hospital's Zairian staff.
