Demjanjuk Trial Opens And Adjourns Til January 19

JERUSALEM (WNS) - The trial of alleged Nazi war criminal John Demjanjuk was foropened mally in Jerusalem District Court and, after a 40minute hearing, was adjourned until January 19.

The Ukrainian-born former resident of Cleveland, Ohio, is charged with responsibility for the deaths of tens of thousands of Jews and others at the Treblinka death camp during World War II where he is alleged to have served as a guard. known to inmates as "Ivan the Terrible" because of his unmitigated brutality. According to the charges, he personally operated the gas chambers.

At this hearing, Demjanjuk and his American lawyer, Mark O'Connor, repeated the defense's contention of mistaken identity. "I am not Ivan the Terrible whom they want to hang," a visibly nervous Demjanjuk told the court.

The official charges against the accused are war crimes, crimes against humanity and
