The Passover Seder provokes many thoughts -- about the continuity of the Jewish people throughout the ages, about the future of Judaism in the modern world, about the role of parents, and about the education of children.

For those of us who are involved in Jewish education, there are many lessons to be learned from the Seder in addition to the retelling of the Exodus story. Like so many works of Jewish tradition, the Haggadah contains valuable insights into self-understanding and our relationships with others.

As teachers, we must be struck by the text that immediately precedes the story of the departure from Egypt. It tells about four children -- the wise one, the simple, 'the arrogant, and the child who does not even know how to ask -- and it instructs us as to how each of them should be told the Passover story. This simple parable reminds us that children differ in their attitudes and their approaches to learning, and cautions us to teach each child in the way he or she understands best.

The same parable also tells us something about ourselves as adults. If we look deep into our own psyches, we may come to realize that the four children are in each of us at different times of our lives.

In an earlier part of the Haggadah, we read about the great rabbis who studied all night and into the early hours of the morning. As always in Judaism, we are reminded that learning is one of the highest achievements, and that even the

most erudite of scholars must continue to study.

With full awareness of this basic Jewish precept, the 3500 Jewish educators who comprise the Coalition for Alternatives in Jewish Education (CAJE) subscribe to the organization's motto "to learn and to teach" and to the statement "I have learned much from teachers, more from my friends, and from my students most of all."

We hope your Passover Seder was a learning and teaching experience for old and young alike, and may you be blessed.

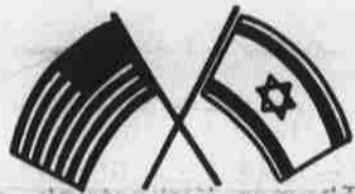
