

AJCongress Helps In Restoration Of Landmark Synagogue In Barbados

These wandering Jews, fleeing from continuing Spanish and Portuguese Inquisitions, had taken refuge in Recife, Brazil. But when the Portuguese regained control of the huge South American country, this tiny Jewish community packed its meager possessions and prepared to set sail for the Netherlands and religious freedom.

However, before leaving Brazil, they received word that Oliver Cromwell had opened British dominions to Jews. They requested, and obtained, permission to settle in Barbados, a sunny island which the English themselves had settled only one year before.

The weary wanderers settled in their new homes, established roots, and as have millions of fellow Jews before and after them, eventually built a synagogue.

Today, descendants of the original group, with the help of the American Jewish Congress, are seeking funds to restore the old building which stands on Synagogue Lane, just off the main street, in Bridgetown, Barbados. So far more than \$75,000 has been collected in the U.S. alone.

Outside the building is the cemetery with many of the oldest tombstones lying flat on the ground in the custom of ancient days. More modern stones stand upright with the Mogen David, or Star of David, etched in gold, shining in the rays of the perpetually warm sun.
