1987 'Defender Of Jerusalem Award' Conferred

The others are: Former Soviet dissident Ida Nudel and the late civil rights leader Bayard Rustin. In memory of Mr. Rustin, who died in August 1987, a scholarship that will provide black students with the opportunity to study in Israel was established by the Jabotinsky Foundation. The \$100,000 prize has been awarded by the Jabotinsky Foundation since 1983 to people who have stood up in defense of Jewish rights.

Israeli Professor To Speak On "Bringing The Human Touch To Community Medicine"



Shimon Glick, M.D., medical school dean of Israel's Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, will speak on "Bringing the Human Touch to Community Medicine" at an upcoming educational forum.

The forum, "Sharing with the World" Israel's Ben-Gurion University of the Negev Comes of Age," will focus on the university's considerable contributions in the fields of medicine, desert agricultural research and social research.

Joining Dr. Glick at the Forum, scheduled from 9:00 a.m. to 12 p.m. Sunday, March 6, 1988, at the

Beverly Hilton Hotel, will be Professor Yosef Mizrahi, Ph. D., senior scientist of the Institute for Applied Research, and the Department of Biology; and Professor Frederick Lazin, Ph.D., Department of Political Science.

In his talk, Dr. Glick, dean and professor of Medicine, Faculty of Health Sciences, and director of Kupat Holim Health services in the Negev, will focus on the unique Beer Sheva approach to medical education that teaches students to explore not only their patients' medical histories but social and economic conditions contributing to their health as well. The Center for the Health Sciences also coordinates health care for residents throughout the Negev, which includes Israel's Ethiopian immigrants and the Bedouin population.

Ben-Gurion University of the Negev will celebrate its "Chai" or 18th year in 1988, coinciding with the 40th anniversary of the founding of the State of Israel.

Inspired by the vision of Israel's founding Prime Minister, David Ben-Gurion, the university was established by the Israeli government in 1969 to spearhead social, scientific, agricultural and industrial growth throughout the country's arid southern region.
