

Angry, Frightened Borough Park Residents Mourn Slain Neighbor

NEW YORK, (JTA) — Hundreds of Orthodox Jews crowded a yeshiva in Brooklyn Sunday to remember a murdered 39-year-old postal worker who left behind a wife, a nine-month-old daughter and a legacy here of sadness, fear and anger.

The "chesped," or memorial service, capped a week of community activism in the predominately Orthodox Borough Park section of Brookiyn, where Eli Wald, a "baal teshuvah," or newly observant Jew, was stabbed more than 11 times coming home from work Dec. 25.

Detectives at the 66th police precinct said Sunday that they are pursuing a few leads in the murder, which many community members felt was bias-related. But Captain Michael Scagnelli, head of the precinct, said the stabbing was the

An Age-Old Problem

Introduction

The violence that has shaken Israel in recent weeks brought with it a wave of critical press commentary on the government's administration of and the security methods it employs on the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

For more than three weeks since the first demonstration in Gaza's Jabaliya refugee camp, television cameras and news publications have focused on the protests of this restive population against the Israeli authorities. Yet, this preoccupation with the current coverage left little room for attention to the historical tragedy that defined Gaza long before Israel won the territory in 1967.

Gaza has never been anything but occupied territory. Ruled first by the Ottoman Empire for several hundred years, then by Britain and Egypt before Israel, Gaza has been long referred to as the "forgotten" or "unwanted" territory. Largely ignored by Britain during the Mandate, the Strip later festered in crowded misery throughout Egypt's 19-year rule.

With no Arab government willing to negotiate the area's future or care for its refugees, the (Continued on page 11)

"With the continued increases in the cost of living, it is important to make seniors aware of the opportunities available for financial assistance", states Deputy Assessor, Mark Schofield.

One of these services, the Senior Citizen Property Tax/Rent Assistance Program, is administered through the Clark County Assessor's Office. This program provides a tax rebate for home owners and mobile home owners, and allows for assistance to renters of mobile homes, apartments and dwellings.

The filing period for this program is from January 15, 1988 through April 30, 1988.

In order to qualify in 1988, a person must be 62

President's Club awards were presented also to Hank and Barbara Greenspun and Paul B. Sogg. years of age by June 30, 1988 and have a total gross income not exceeding \$15,100 for the previous year. Gross income means all income of every type received by an individual applicant, or combined income of a husband and wife, including social security and pension payments. If an income tax return is filed with the Internal Revenue, the Nevada Department of Taxation requires that a copy of the income tax return accompany the application.

Mobile home renters of space and renters of apartments and dwellings must have been residents of Clark County for the last six months of 1987. Home owners and mobile home owners must have been residents of Clark County six months prior to filing their application.

Senior Citizens who received assistance last year will automatically be mailed a 1988 application.

If you are a new applicant, you are asked to supply the Assessor's Office with a copy of your birth certificate, current Nevada Driver's License
