

Kitty Dukakis Campaigns For Mike In Nevada

Katherine S. (Kitty) Dukakis, wife of Democratic Presidential candidate Michael S. Dukakis, governor of Massachusetts, campaigned for her husband in Las Vegas, recently.

Arriving in the afternoon, Mrs. Dukakis was met by Charles Waterman and Elizabeth Foley, prominent local Democrats who have taken the lead in southern Nevada support for Gov. Dukakis.

Mrs. Dukakis then went to the home of Edythe Katz in Las Vegas for a fund raising reception. Mrs. Katz knew the governor's wife through Mrs. Dukakis' work on the President's Commission on the Holocaust.

Following the reception, Mrs. Dukakis visited the Nevada Dukakis Headquarters at 557 E. Sahara for a reception with campaign volunteers.

Mrs. Dukakis has been a regular campaigner for her husband since he announced his candidacy in the spring. At home in Massachusetts she has a reputation as a strong and independent woman, but on the Presidential trail her remarks have been punctuated with phrases like "Michael believes" and "Michael thinks."

But Mrs. Dukakis says she is not deliberately playing a low-key role in her husband's campaign. "I'm out there and I have been one of the more active and I want it to be that way," she told a reporter.

The rest of the family has also been actively campaigning. Their son, John, is the southern regional director for the campaign, while their eldest daughter, Andrea, is campaigning in Iowa. Their youngest daughter is a freshman at Brown University, but she campaigns during her school holidays.

Mrs. Dukakis was born in Cambridge, MA, and was graduated from Lesley College with a degree in education. She later received a Masters in broadcast and film from Boston University.

Her interests range from human rights to the arts.

In addition to her work on the Holocaust Commission, Mrs. Dukakis organized a task force on Cambodian children which twice took her to Thailand. She serves as a trustee of the Washington-based Refugee Policy Group and as director of Refugee International.

Mrs. Dukakis also serves on the executive committee of the New England anti-Defamation League and has worked on efforts to strengthen bonds between the people of Israel and the U.S. She is chairman of the Governor's Advisory Committee on the Homeless in Massachusetts.

Since 1985 Mrs. Dukakis has been a director of the Public Space Partnerships project, a joint venture between the John F. Kennedy School of Government and the Graduate School of Design at Harvard University.

Committed to the visual and performing arts, Mrs. Dukakis is the daughter of well-known conductor Harry Ellis Dickson who, until he retired earlier this year, was associate conductor of the Boston Pops and a first violinist with the Boston Symphony Orchestra.

Caesars Palace Hotel & Restaurant Win Mobil Four-Star Awards



Caesars Palace, and its gourmet restaurant, the Palace Court, have been presented 1988 Mobil Travel Guide Four-Star Awards, signifying they are "outstanding, worth a special trip." The Palace Court is one of only three restaurants in Nevada to receive the designation, and is the only one located in Las Vegas. Caesars Palace is one of only two hotels in Las Vegas to be distinguished with the award.

Such recognition places the Palace Court and Caesars Palace in the top two percent of more than 21,000 establishments that were evaluated this year. The hotel and restaurant are two of only 409 establishments which are current Four-Star winners.

Mobil Travel Guide field representatives look at physical structure, furnishings, maintenance, housekeeping, food service and overall service at Four-Star lodgings and restaurants. More than 100 field representatives crisscross the continent to visit and rate each establishment. In addition to their inspection reports, the Four-Star ratings also reflect thousands of reader responses received by the Guild each year.

Special features of a Four-Star hotel include distinctive building design, a luxurious lobby and public space, fine art work, extended room service hours, a supervised health club, among others. A Four-Star restaurant should have original cuisine as well as classics; fresh, high-quality ingredients; an extensive wine list; fine crystal, china and linen; unique table settings; and table arrangements that allow privacy and quiet.

WASHINGTON (JTA) — Unlike most Ivy League schools with large Jewish populations, Cornell University is not near a city with a substantial Jewish community. In fact, Cornell's 3,000 students comprise the bulk of the Jewish community of Ithaca, N.Y.

The school traditionally has been at a disadvantage in recruiting students to observe kashrut. In addition to having no kosher butchers or restaurants within a 40-mile radius, its only kosher dining plan, operated by the National Council of Young Israel, can feed only a few dozen students.

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
