

**Just For Laughs -- It's
Rodney Dangerfield With
Bob Nelson At
Caesars Palace March 16 - 22**



Rodney Dangerfield returns to Caesars Palace Circus Maximus Showroom March 16 - 22 for cocktail shows that also star funnyman Bob Nelson.

Always popular as a standup comedian, Dangerfield is also a successful film star. "Caddyshack," "Easy Money" and "Back to School" were all box office successes, with "Back to School" a runaway hit both in the U.S. and overseas. Rodney has a new film project in the works for Orion Pictures and Twentieth Century Fox, a movie about a baseball scout titled "The Scout."

Also coming up for Dangerfield is an animated feature titled "Rover Dangerfield," in which Rodney will do the voice of a dog who gets no respect.

But, as popular as he has been in movies, Rodney loves a live audience best. "When you make a film it's 'Quiet on the set! We're doing a comedy!'" Rodney says. The roar of the crowd is still the most gratifying for him.

A regular at Caesars Palace, Dangerfield didn't always tour extensively. While his two children were young, he didn't want to travel for months on the road. So he opened his own nightclub in New York -- Dangerfield's.

Now they're grown and on the move, and so is Rodney. With his trademark red tie and white shirt on display in the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C., he's one of the hottest comedians in the country.

Bob Nelson is making a return engagement with Rodney Dangerfield. Described by one reviewer as a virtual "Macy's Day parade of comedy," Nelson has a hilarious "file cabinet" of onstage characters which come to life with simple props and wild facial expressions.

Donning a helmet and stuffing his sweater with balloons as shoulder pads, Nelson does a routine about an entire football lineup. The act paid off with an appearance on NBC's "Sports Talk" and a commendable roster of fans among NFL players.

Nelson's other TV appearances include: "The Merv Griffin Show," "Late Night With David Letterman" and "The Dr. Ruth Show."

**Volunteers Needed For Jewish

The Jewish community of Switzerland requires a French-speaking person to run formal and informal educational programs.

To fill the needs of these and other Jewish communities around the world, the Corps of Service to the Jewish People has been established by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations "to lift the Jewish spirit and literacy of needful communities," according to Rabbi Alexander M. Schindler, UAHC president.

The Corps of Service was proposed by Rabbi Schindler and adopted by the Reform Jewish movement late last year.

The new program is open to Jewish com-

munities regardless of ideological affiliation and has already elicited requests from Jewish communities on four continents.

Volunteers Sought

Rabbi Daniel Syme, vice president of the UAHC, said the corps is currently looking for post-college and retired Jewish men and women to serve Jewish communities abroad in the fields of Jewish education, public health, computers and leadership development.

Dinitz, a Laborite, is expected to be replaced by Yaacov Gil, who heads the list of Labor candidates who fell short of election to the Knesset in 1984.

But Gil is taking nothing for granted. "Let's wait and see," he told reporters.

leave the country with their families. Still many of us remain. We and our families continue to find ourselves in the same state of uncertainty and stress which has affected our health, strength and our professional capabilities."

One of the hunger strikers on the list received by Action for Soviet Jewry, Vera Sheiba of Leningrad, was informed last week that she and her husband Lev had received permission to emigrate. They both had been denied because of alleged possession of state secrets.

Another hunger strike will begin when Yuli Kosharovsky of Moscow launches a 17-day fast, one day for each year he has been a refusenik.
