

Passover Aid, Prayers And Other Outreach Planned

NEW YORK (JTA) — Jewish organizations have planned a variety of outreach programs and prayers for other Jews this Passover.

The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee is distributing matza and other seder necessities to needy Jewish communities in 70 countries through Operation Passover.

This year, more than 200,000 pounds of Passover matza, some 30,000 pounds of matza meal, wine, jam, gefilte fish and other Passover foods were purchased and shipped to Jews in private homes, community centers and villages from Egypt to Hungary, from India to Portugal and many other Jewish bases.

The American Jewish World Service has launched its second annual Afikoman Pledge," asking American Jews at their seders to "renew the commitment to help all who are hungry around the world, so that next year we may all be free."

AJWS, an international development and disaster relief organization, hopes to double the 150 congregations in 30 states that raised more than \$45,000 last year for projects in 18 of the poorest countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America. For more information, call (617) 267-6656.

Manischewitz, the kosher food and wine manufacturer, has joined the American Rabbinic Network for Ethiopian Jewry in a relief campaign for the remaining 15,000 Ethiopian Jews.

More than 3,100 matza boxes, labelled "Mitz-vahs Not Matzas, are being distributed to North American synagogues, Jewish community centers and Jewish-owned businesses. The boxes are symbolically void of matza to represent the empty stomachs of Ethiopian Jews but contain information on the Ethiopian Jews and an Afikoman service, which calls for a commitment to rescue the Ethiopian Jews in exchange for the Afikoman.
