The Music Educators of Clark County were honored on the 150th Anniversary of Music Educators in Public Schools by the Las Vegas Symphony Orchestra at a concert recently.

Kenneth Miller, Las Vegas Symphony Orchestra Board of Trustee President, presented a special plaque from the Clark County Commissioners to Dr. Robert Wentz - Superintendent of Schools for the occasion.

Noted Soviet Composer Vyacheslav Artyomov from Moscow made a special Las Vegas appearance for the U.S. Premiere of his work "Lamentations" - William Powell, a clarinet virtuoso thrilled the audience with an exquisite rendition of Mozart's "Clarinet Concerto."

TEL AVIV (JTA) — Israel and Hungary established interest sections in Budapest and Tel Aviv respectively. It is the lowest level of diplomatic representation, but nevertheless marks a resumption of diplomatic ties broken by Hungary during the 1967 Six Day War.

A Hungarian representative, Jerri Genish, handed his letter of appointment to Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres in Jerusalem, while Shlomo Merom, an Israeli diplomat with the rank of ambassador, did the same at the Foreign Ministry in Budapest.

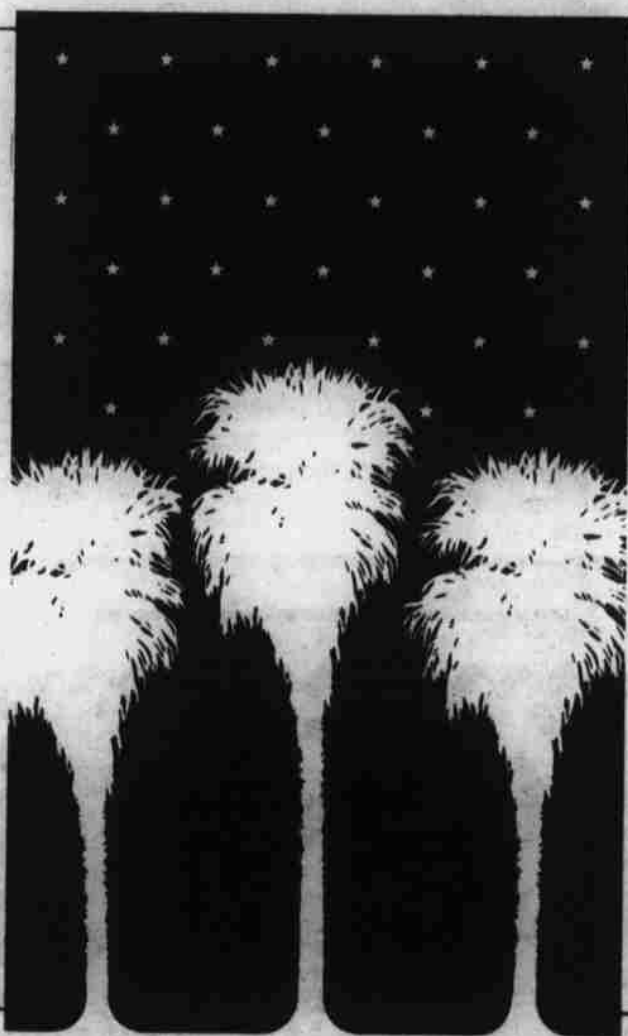
