Sheldon Grozalsky of Las Vegas has claimed the 1989 title and \$107,000 in the Stardust Hotel's World Football Handicapping Championship.

In the Stardust's handicapping championship, each entrant paid \$2,500 for the privilege of selecting one professional or college team each week. If the team selected won, the entrant stayed in the contest for another week. If the team lost, the entrant was out of the contest. The last remaining contestant took all entry fees and the free-roll Super Bowl bet.

For the final four weeks of the contest, only two contestants remained.

"The last four weeks were very close," Grozalsky said. "In the Washington/UCLA game, I had Washington and 3½. They were down by six or seven points until the final drive of the game. They scored the winning touchdown in the final seconds and covered the spread."
