Agony In Jerusalem Bus Bombing Takes Heavy Human Toll, Rocks Political Campaign

Recently, I attended the funeral of Yonatan (Yoni) Barnea, one of 23 victims killed in a recent Jerusalem bus bombing. The Mount Herzl military cemetery – which had to stagger the many funerals for victims of the Jerusalem and Ashkelon bus blasts to accommodate thousands of mourners – was densely packed. Yet only the sounds of Kaddish being recited could be heard.

Suddenly, the air was pierced by the wail of sirens. It was evident that another tragedy was in the making. By the time we came down to the parking lot, Israel Radio had broadcast that one more person was killed, and many injured in a Jerusalem suburb, by a Palestinian who intentionally ran his car into a group of pedestrians waiting for a bus.

How does one make any sense of these senseless killings? How can Israelis absorb so many blows and return to some sense of normalcy? How do these attacks impact on the peace process and the upcoming elections.

These are difficult questions. But after each of these attacks, not to mention almost any historic or major event, there is one person who can be counted upon to shed light on such developments: Nahum Barnea. He is one of Israel's foremost journalists, a brilliant analyst and wordsmith. His articles and columns in *Yediot Achronot* are "must reading" in this country. And he is regarded as one of the most personable people in the local establishment.


Nahum's voice was silenced by the Jerusalem bombing. Yoni, his 20-year-old son, was on the bombed-out bus. Like so many other of the victims, Yoni was a soldier leaving home early that morning to return to his base. And adding cruel irony to this tragedy, Nahum was at the scene of the blast, his pen and notebook in hand, not knowing his son was one of the victims.

I write this not only because of my friendship with Nahum, but because it's an expression of how these hideous attacks impact on the lives of so many Israelis. The perversity and randomness of these killings cannot be absorbed. Not by those who live daily with terror and have experienced its aftermath through many, far too many, national days of mourning. And not by the families, who will carry a sense of pain and loss for the rest of their lives.

Over 100 people have been killed by suicide bomb attacks since the Oslo accords
