ELKS IN SESSION

A Good, Instructive and Entertaining Time At The Hotel Las Vegas.

HONORABLE C. O. WHITTEMORE TALKS

Vegas Will Have All Modern Improvements and Be Best City in Country.

OTHER ELOQUENT ADDRESSES MADE

On Thursday evening there assembled in the spacious dining room of the Hotel Las Vegas, as jolly a crowd of good fellows as ever assembled around a festive board in the state of Nevada. It was the first social session of the B. P. O. E., or a good social time meeting of the Elks. It was the bringing together of many of these genial and wholesome spirits and some of their friends, from every section and source of our common country.

It was an evening in which wit, humor, hilarity, stories and reminiscences, Las Vegas, organization of government, sewerage, sanitation and what is best for our growing city, played a part. It was also ordained that a committee of three: Butler, Busted and Telford make arrangements for a permanent headquarters for an Elk club. Opportunity for the full expression of the social and "laugh and the world laughs with you" side of the Elks and their friends.

The post prandial talks were full of inspiring and encouraging sentiments. The Elks as a whole are bright, alert, able and eloquent representatives. This forceful feature was present Thursday night in all its radiance. Good speeches, entertaining recitations and songs that were as sweet and chime as that of the nightingale regaled and enthused the participants. Refreshments too consoled and pleased the assembled guests.

Everything done was in line with good fellowship and the fraternity emblematic of such an occasion. The most notable talk was that of C. O. Whittemore. This was in the nature of assurances as to the future of Vegas; it assured the citizens that the streets would be curbed and graded; that a good water system would be introduced; that the railroad company would not destroy competition or interfere with individual enterprise; that machinery would be introduced to test the water of the valley or bore for an artesian flow; that the fertility of the soil is such as to make our cultivable resources equal to any in the world; that we are in the richest mineral belt of the universe; that the townsite company will spray the streets with oil; and that Las Vegas will be a city of great and prosperous proportions enriching those who are wise enough to look into the future. He also learnedly discussed upon organization of town government and the best and manner to bring about systematic regulations in the absence of a legally organized municipality. Time and again as these words flowed from the sage of Vegas the crowd cheered and applauded him. All realize that they were the words of the man from the inside.

A. L. Jones, also discussed sewerage and sanitation. They were scientific observations, worth listening to, and if the people are wise, will be adopted and applied at once.
