**STONE BEATS SCORPION IN THE RECENT RACE**

It Was a Fleet Exhibition and Enjoyed by Spectators.

**INITIAL TO GREATER EVENTS.**

Unexcelled Climate Which Will Make Vegas the Horseman's Paradise.

**VICTOR KEEPS LEAD FROM FIRST**

Talk about sports! It is not necessary to go to Gravesend or Frisco, or any of those well-known race tracks, to see a good race done in the flesh of the horse—that species of quadruped we are all in such love with.

Vegas has a climate unexcelled for this sport—a horse is all spirit and fire, with the inhaling of this dry, exhilarating ozone. As a consequence no better or more speedy animals can be found than those that browse in the Vegas Valley.

This excellence has been prompting the local sports to arrange for speed contests between neighboring steeds whose fleetness can only be compared with a gale blowing sixty miles an hour.

The first of these splendid exhibitions of good racing, of fleet running, of whirlwind horse tempests took place on Sunday afternoon on the beautiful green sward and great open fields below the Rancho.

The stakes were \$200 to the winner. The horses were the fiery "Scorpion," a bay, and the fleet-footed "Stone," a gray—beautiful animals, both.

The rider on "Scorpion" was Al Myers, owner; on "Stone," John Tuck, cool and collected.

The distance run, 586 2/3 yards—1,750 feet—or one third of a mile. Howard Tuttle, starter.

The race throughout was eminently satisfactory and full of excitement for the invited spectators. With Tuttle's "go" the horses were off.

The race was swiftly run and gallantly won. The winner, "Stone," or, definitely speaking "Quick," was the favorite of the crowd from the beginning. The blue sky, the welcome breeze and balmy air seemed like a piston rod to rush "Stone" on to victory. "Scorpion" was a good second. How they did fly down that course and what tension existed until the cry went up, "Stone wins." The horses responded gamely but "Stone" shot ahead from the start and maintained his lead until the finish. The rider, Tuck, showed his mettle and every inch of him was the ideal rider.

Money was bet and money changed hands on the race. The winners were happy and the losers consoled themselves with the compensation of a good race.

Only the fellows on the inside were present. They had an enjoyable time. In future these events will become public enjoyment.

It is safe to predict that in the near future Vegas will have a race course that will compare with the best in the country. It has superior climate and for fall and winter racing there is no place on terra firma to beat it. This advantage is attracting the attention of the horsemen and it is a safe prediction that Vegas, with its other advantages, will soon have fame as the racer's or horseman's paradise.

Vegas has a combination of attributes that makes it a marvel and with a future that will be marvelous.

The race run Sunday is the entering wedge to greater and more notable events.
