CLOCK WITH THIRTEEN DIALS. Timeplece Made in England for East-

ern Potentate.

A remarkable clock has just been made in England, for the palace of an Eastern potentate. It has thirteen dials, showing the time in as many dit ferent cities, viz.: London, Paris, Rome, Berlin, Vienna, St. Petersburg, Constantinople, Washington, Yokohama, Peking, Bombay, Samarkand and Teheran. Thus the owner will be able to see at a glance time in these cities, as compared with that of his own capital. The figures and also the names of the various cities are in native



character, and each dial is mounted in a very handsome ormolu frame richly engraved.

STABLES IN A TREE.

Natives of Bahama Islands Find Strueture Ready Made.

In the Bahama islands there flourishes a tree the roots of which attain to enormous proportions, often reaching to a height of fifteen or twenty feet above the surface of the earth. spreading in all directions, underground as well, in order to obtain sustenance and give support to the trunk and branches. On the tree grow innumerable balls of silky cotton, presenting an almost fairy-like appearance as they glisten in the sunlight. They are in great demand for stuffing pillows, being soft as down. The spaces formed by the roots are often quite as large as fair-sized rooms, and, if roofed over, one tree would form a commodious dwelling place for a family; in fact, it would be infinitely superior to the average native hut. Holes could be cut in the roots to allow of internal communication. Up to the present, however, the natives have not utilized them as houses, though they are frequently in request as stables for horses.

TRAMWAY IN A CHURCH.

Moyable Pulpit a Feature of English House of Worship.

Movable pulpits can be found in various churches throughout the country, but the movable pulpit recently presented to St. Paul's. Cheltenham, Eng., is the only one worked by mahas been laid down in the chancel, and immediately before the sermon the pulpit and its staircase move along it slowly, noiselessly, and almost mysteriously, and take up a prominent position, returning to the original position beside the organ at the conclusion of the preacher's discourse. There is 30 feet of wire rope apparatus employed, the structure being caused to move on what is known as the "spindle" principle. The innovation, striking as it is, is a most convenient one, the preacher being able to address his congregation practically in full view of everyone. The pulpit is lighted by electricity from the inside, the coil conveying the current being paid out as it moves.


